"SWAT FLY HATCHERY" IS AGAIN THE SLOGAN

State-Wide Attack Is to Be Made Upon Breeding Places.

"Swat the fly hatchery." This is the message that is being carried all over the state by inspectors of the state board of health who, under the direction of secretary Dr. T. B. Beatty, are carrying on a state-wide cleanup campaign. Inspectors are visiting all the small communities of the state and encouraging the towns to hold clean-up days and, according to reports received by Dr. Beatty, these events have so far been very successful and much good has been accomplished.

While the swat the fly campaign is being encouraged in every possible way, the movement to swat the hatcheries or breeding places is considered more important. Garbage piles, heaps of refuse and other places where the pests breed are being cleaned up as rapidly as possible, and, together with the early destruction of as many flies as possible, Dr. Beatty believes that Utah will have many hundred million less flies this year.

COMMUNICATED.

In regard to divorce many seem to be very much surprised when so many of these cases show up on the civil calendars of our courts. To me, however, it is a matter of easy explanation and what can naturally be expected. Mothers give too much freedom to their children and fathers take too much home into their systems. Children follow the examples taught them. "Apples never drop very far from the apple tree."

Another thing, boys and girls are raised in such close contact that they finally lose respect for each other, and before they are really ready to speak of love they have passed through the "love stage." The results are that few have the right conception of raising a family and staying with the marriage vows. Many get married, knowing in advance that within a few weeks or a few months the newness of the experience will have worn off and the divorce courts are asked to separate them.

Raise good kids and we won't have so many divorces. Hold the children at home and check up on everything they do. Put a limit on the word "freedom" for their benefit, but go the limit to increase their respect for their parents and let them know what the word "shame" means. Keep sexes separated until they are of mature age. These, and many other things mothers must watch and a failure to watch them means the payment of a big penalty afterwards.

ARRANGING TO TAKE CARE OF BANKERS IN JUNE

A meeting of the business men of Price is being arranged to take place in the immediate future to formulate plans for the handling of the bankers' convention which will meet here Friday and Saturday, June 12th and 13th.

Carl H. Marston is in receipt of the following suggestions from J. E. Shepard, secretary of the Utah Bankers' association:

"Now that we have definitely decided upon Friday and Saturday, June 12th and 13th, for the days upon which to hold the sixth annual convention of our association, we should begin at once to advertise the same and arrange the program. It will be necessary for you to select some one to offer the invocation, and deliver the address of welcome. It will also be very appropriate to select one of your ablest citizens to deliver an address upon some live subject such as irrigation, mining, etc. No doubt you have in mind arranging the social features and hotel accommodations. President Knorr thinks we should be on hand Thursday evening, June 11th, ready to begin our labors early Friday morning. By so doing, the work of the convention can be completed by Saturday noon and leave Saturday afternoon for those who are inclined to visit your mines.

You will recall that it has been the practice to have the banquet on the evening of the first day.

"The convention hall should be arranged for and conveniences provided such as typewriters, etc. I have already begun to advertise the meeting and shall be pleased to assist you in every way possible to make the sixth annual convention the very best yet. Prospects are very favorable for our securing the services of Fred K. Farnsworth, general secretary of the American Bankers' association, which is of itself a large drawing card. We hope to secure other prominent speakers. It has been the practice of the executive committee to appropriate two hundred dollars out of the association's funds to assist in defraying the expenses of the convention. I shall be pleased to hear from you on the above at an early date."

FUSION PROGRAM OUTLINED BY DEMOCRATS

While the ordinary progressive loves the democratic policy both past and present about as much as his astrakhan majesty loves holy water, nevertheless a fusion of the two parties is being shoved down the throats of Utah progressives by the state leaders. Here is the program as outlined and made public by Democratic state Chairman Samuel H. Thurman and to which many of the prominent state progressives have subscribed:

(a) The democrats shall nominate a candidate for United States senator, whom the progressives shall endorse, provided that he shall subscribe to a program of progressive legislation.

(b) The progressives shall nominate the candidate for justice of the supreme court, whom the democrats shall endorse.

(c) The nomination for state superintendent of public instruction shall be made without reference to the politics of the candidates for the place.

(d) The progressives are to have their choice of congressional districts, while the nominees of the other district shall be a democrat.

(e) The question of union of forces in the various counties will be left to the local organizations, with the recommendation that, wherever practicable, such a combination be effected as to insure the election of progressive members to the state legislature.
