

FARMERS' ROUNDUP AT PRICE NEXT WEEK

What promises to be one of the most interesting and beneficial roundups ever held in Carbon county along agricultural lines will be given on Monday and Tuesday, the 20th and 21st of April, when several experts from the Agricultural College of Utah will visit Price.

An interesting program will be given in the City Hall on Monday at 7:30 o'clock in the evening.

On Tuesday at 9:30 o'clock in the morning lectures and demonstrations will be held in the auditorium at the high school.

In the afternoon grain judging, potato judging, stock judging, milk testing and demonstrations of how to treat wheat and potatoes before planting will be shown.

While these things will be chiefly interesting to the farmers, their wives will be entertained along the lines of household duties under the auspices of the Carbon county high school domestic art and science departments.

The committee in charge desires every farmer, business man and all others who may be interested in bettering their condition by learning the meaning of intensive and scientific farming be present at all

of these meetings and demonstrations.

Bring in your seed wheat and potatoes, horses, cows, chickens, pigs, etc., and have the experts show you where you might improve your stock, which means increased profits to you and an opportunity for farmers having produce or stock for sale to place it before the public. It will give business men an opportunity to exhibit their goods and improved machinery.

BLACK HAWK MAY HAVE A HIGH SCHOOL BRANCH

The Black Hawk and Hiawatha district is making effort to have a branch of the Carbon county high school established at Black Hawk. At the meeting of the high school board Saturday afternoon a committee composed of C. H. Marcusen, LeRoy Cowles and Mosiah Hall reported that it had visited the district but had received the information that on account of the slackness of business at the coal camps the people did not feel like offering much inducement at this time to help in putting up the necessary buildings for the accommodation of the pupils. Mr. Donlin, however, stated that the was not at Black Hawk during the committee's visit and he believed it could be arranged so that accommodations could be afforded. The matter will be decided upon later, probably at the next meeting of the board.
