GOSLIN SHEEP DECISION

Authority of State Board Upheld By Court Decision.

The Goslin sheep case decided by Judge Albert F. Christensen of the district court was watched with a great deal of interest by all sheepmen of the state, as well as sections of adjoining states where it has been the custom for herds to cross the state line. In this matter the authority of the state board of sheep commissioners as defined by the statute was brought into question. The history of the case follows:

W. T. Goslin of Colorado drove 22,000 head of sheep over the line into Utah last fall. The board of sheep commissioners had issued an order in August to compel the dipping of sheep driven over the state line from Colorado. Goslin refused, contending that his sheep had not been exposed since they were dipped the previous spring. He said the sheep could not be inspected and that the demand of the sheep commissioners was therefore unreasonable.

The board proceeded to take charge of Goslin's sheep with the result that Goslin secured a temporary injunction preventing the board from acting. He asked that the injunction be made permanent.

The court held that it would be presumed that the board considered it necessary to issue the order to Goslin to dip his sheep and that such an order would be considered a reasonable one, the injunction therefore being dissolved. Judge Christensen ordered costs of the case assessed to Goslin.

The law under which the order was passed and which Goslin considered unreasonable is as follows:

"Section 11. The board, or any person in the employ thereof, shall have authority to enter upon premises where sheep are kept, and to examine, inspect and disinfect sheep found thereon. The board shall have authority to require owners of sheep to apply such disinfectants, dips and other curative agents as may, by the board or its employees, be deemed necessary in order to prevent the introduction or dissemination of disease among the sheep of this state, or to effect a cure of affected or infected sheep, and in the event that any owner or custodian of sheep shall refuse or neglect to comply with the regulations of the board regarding the use of such disinfectants, dips and curative substances within the time set by the board or its employees, then the board or its employees shall have authority to treat or disinfect any such sheep and the cost thereof, together with all incidental expenses thereon, if any, which shall include the cost and expense of the care and maintenance of the said sheep during the time of their custody by the board, as herein provided, shall be borne by the owner of the sheep so treated or disinfected, and shall be, until paid, a first lien against such sheep."

D. A. Callister, secretary of the sheep board, says a majority of the sheepmen will welcome the decision, as the law which flockmasters were instrumental in having passed, is of great importance to the preservation of sheep. Under this new law, disease among sheep has been practically eradicated.

NEWSPAPERS ARE THE BEST MEDIUMS FOR ADVERTISING

Big Concern After Investigation Finds Against Magazines.

G. M. Brown, president of the General Roofing and Manufacturing company of East St. Louis, a concern that expends more than \$200,000 annually in making known the merit of its product, has decided to advertise in the newspapers to the exclusion of all magazines.

Mr. Brown came to the conclusion that magazine advertising was not the most effective. He decided on an experimental campaign with the newspapers and selected such dailies as the Kansas City Star, the Republic, the Chicago Tribune, the Cincinnati Enquirer and the Boston Globe. This was January 5th. The results were so extremely satisfactory that the list of papers has been enlarged and it now includes about a hundred and fifty of the leading ones in the United States, besides several in Australia, Europe and Canada. It receives itself in to this, according to Mr. Brown: Newspapers are the cheapest mediums and offer the only thorough and practical system of advertising.

ZION COMMERCIAL CLUB WILL RAISE \$40,000.00

The Salt Lake Commercial club has undertaken the gigantic task of raising \$40,000, which sum, the organization will spend solely for the purpose of advertising the resources of the state. Of this amount the soliciting committee has secured subscriptions aggregating \$16,000.

FORTY-FIVE HUNDRED FOR TRAIL

Midland Route Receives Heavy Subscription.

Good roads boosters at Grand Junction, Colo., last week subscribed forty-five hundred dollars and paid their subscriptions later to complete the construction of the Midland trail from Mack to Cimco, in Utah, a distance of about forty miles. An Associated Press telegram from Grand Junction contains this information:

"Thirty-five miles of grading will be done on the old narrow gauge grade of the Denver and Rio Grande railroad. Twenty-four culverts and fourteen bridges will be built. The contracts for the various jobs will be let immediately. Practically all the work is in the state of Utah, but subscriptions were entirely secured in Mesa county, Colo. Officials of the Midland Trail association feel it is hopeless to expect aid from Grand county or Utah road officials and are determined to keep the road anyway."

"Work will be of a permanent character and completed in four weeks and be ready for the first cars. This is said to be the only instance known of people in one state digging up several thousand dollars to build a road in another state and recalls the famous trail blazing trip when twenty Grand Junction business men two years ago accompanied A. L. Westgard to Salt Lake City in spite of warnings of road boosters in Zion that the trip would cost the men two thousand dollars. But it proved that this is the gateway to the west from Colorado."

UTAH POWER AND LIGHT WILL ENTER COLORADO

Will Close Down Eastern Utah Plants, Prediction.

It seems more than probable that the recent bonding of the Utah Power and Light company for \$100,000,000 means that this concern's intention of building a line through the state and into Colorado is to be an actuality. Those who should be in a position to know state that the extension work will be completed during the present year. Several with whom The Advocate has talked about the matter predict that the extended operations of the company will close down practically every power and light plant in Eastern Utah. Representatives of some of the larger operating coal companies state that they welcome the advent of the mammoth electric enterprise as it will be possible to secure fuel at a cost considerably below the figure that it now is manufactured for.

The Mining Review, Salt Lake, has the following to say regarding the extension of the power company:

"The Utah Power and Light company has filed a mortgage in favor of the Guaranty Trust company of New York, providing for the issue of \$100,000,000 worth of 5 per cent 20-year first mortgage gold bonds. This should mean much for the mining industry in this and adjacent states, where the coming of the lines of the power company has not only provided electrical power for small operators, but at cheaper cost. In old districts it has already reduced rates voluntarily. The company has plants in Colorado, Utah and Idaho."

J. W. EDMUNDS APPOINTED CLARK COMPANY RECEIVER

J. W. Edmunds, an expert accountant, has been appointed receiver for the A. A. Clark Construction company, pending the appointment of trustees to conserve the assets of the company. His bonds were fixed at \$10,000 by Judge John A. Marshall of the federal court.

When the petition for bankruptcy was filed by the creditors of the company, the company declared it was not bankrupt and demanded a jury trial. The jury trial was waived when the case was called for hearing last Thursday.
