PRICE GREEKS SWINDLED

Smooth Customer Sells California Real Estate—Fictitious Deeds.

A. J. Condon, wanted in Price for alleged forgery and who is said by members of Salt Lake county's sheriff's force to have swindled Greek miners out of approximately \$7000 by selling them fictitious deeds to land in Southern California, was arrested Saturday in Elko by Deputy Sheriff B. H. Sawyer. The arrest was made at the Hotel Utah, where Condon has been a guest since his arrival in Salt Lake last Wednesday.

Condon arrived in Price April 26th and being of Greek extraction and speaking the language fluently he easily won the confidence of the Greek residents of Price. He seemed conversant with the finer points of land selling and was well posted on the locations of mines and the better farming tracts in California, reports from Price say. He, it is alleged, represented himself as an agent for a large real estate company in Los Angeles, and succeeded, it is said, in selling about 300 acres.

The Salt Lake authorities are inclined to believe that Condon is one of several men who have forged and passed checks in various parts of Utah during the past six months. Had checks aggregating \$10,000 have been passed in Salt Lake and Utah and the Elko police and members of the sheriff's force declare that it is the work of a clever gang of forgers. The checks for the most part have been forged on accounts of the larger mining and construction companies operating in Utah.

GOULD ISSUES TURNED DOWN

Bankers Refuse to Extend Loan of \$25,000,000.

NEW YORK, May 8.—The latest attempt to readjust the finances of the Gould railroad system came to naught today when Kuhn, Loeb & Company, bankers, announced their refusal to extend the \$25,000,000 of Missouri Pacific railway three-year notes which matured on May 1st.

The bankers declined to state the reason for their conclusion, except to say that "conditions governing the affairs of the property do not warrant such an undertaking by them at this time."

It is expected that a detailed statement dealing with Kuhn, Loeb & Company's examination of Missouri Pacific by their experts and probably incorporating the substance of their communications to the Gould interests, will be issued next week.

Directors of the Missouri Pacific were holding a special session at the time the bankers issued their statement, but soon adjourned to meet again tomorrow, when it is likely that some arrangement will be made to meet the Missouri Pacific notes. This may be done by an issue of new notes, bearing a higher rate of interest, or may be effected by an extension of a year or more, together with a cash bonus.

Speyer & Company, who floated the notes now falling due, and officials of which firm are represented in the Missouri Pacific directory, would not discuss the latest turn of events, except to express the belief that the demands of the note holders would be met.

Missouri Pacific and other Gould issues were among the weakest features of the day's reactionary stock market.

The action of the New York bankers in turning down the Gould securities brings the following editorial comment from the Salt Lake Tribune:

"The refusal of Kuhn, Loeb and company to extend the \$25,000,000 of Missouri Pacific three-year notes has caused a drop in the Gould securities and may foreshadow passing of control into stronger hands. Indeed, arrangements to that end were recently made but failed when the eldest daughter of the founder of the family future insisted upon retaining her stock through a matter of sentiment. Raising the money to pay these three-year notes, therefore, may be contingent upon the property's being taken over by some interests other than the Goulds."

MOTHER'S DAY UNIVERSAL

People of All Civilized Nations Commemorate May 10th.

In honor of "the best mother that ever lived" the peoples of all civilized nations in the world celebrated Sunday as Mother's Day. The second Sunday in May is being universally set aside as a worldwide time for the remembrance by some special act of mother and father, it being so much father's day as mother's, though the latter's name is used to note it. It is now generally observed by some distinct act of kindness, visit, letter, gift or tribute showing remembrance of the mother and father to whom grateful affection is due.

On May 10, 1912, a resolution passed the United States House of Representatives and the Senate commending Mother's Day for observance by the house, senate, the president, his cabinet and other heads of governmental departments. In Nebraska and Pennsylvania it is a legal holiday. Since 1912 Governor Colquhoun of Texas has made it an annual custom to pardon a number of convicts on Mother's Day.

Mother's Day and the Mother's Day International Association, which promotes the celebration of the day, were founded by Anna Jarvis of Philadelphia. The association is active in urging the celebration in all countries. In the United States President Wilson and former Presidents Roosevelt and Taft are honorary national officers of the association.

War On White Plague.

The annual meeting of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis is in session at Washington. The report of the executive office shows that there are 2500 consumption-fighting agencies in the United States, while there were less than 200 in 1901. While great progress toward checking the ravages of the white plague has been made along many lines, sanitation being one of the most important, tens of thousands of victims of the dread disease go down to a premature grave each year.

During the course of the meeting a report will probably be made upon the efficacy of the turtle serum as a remedy for tuberculosis. The report will not be favorable and a final blow will be dealt to the hopes of those who tried to have faith that the German chemist had discovered something of value. The other reports will show the advance made along familiar lines, but so far as known there is no new remedy for consumption, or anything upon which to base a hope that the disease will be conquered in the near future.

Postmaster Examinations.

Civil service examination will be held in Price at the City Hall tomorrow for fourth class postmasters for the following postoffices: Castle Dale, Emery, Ferris, Hiawatha, Orangeville, Scofield, Winter Quarters and Woodside.
