### FARMERS ALL TAKE NOTICE.

The destruction of our alfalfa fields has become so great through the attack made by the measuring worms that it has become necessary to again warn all producers.

Last winter was an ideal one for insect life to live over, and as a result we have numberless larvae of the measuring worms, due to many adults having survived the winter.

The geometrids, or measuring worms, a subfamily of the order Lepidoptera, have a complete metamorphosis. In the larvae or caterpillar stage they have six thoracic or front legs and four abdominal legs, biting mouth parts, and do a tremendous amount of damage.

Those who have not already cut the first crop of hay should not delay a minute. As quickly as the hay can be hauled off, the land should be gone over with something to produce a dust on the surface of the ground and retard the second crop growth a few days. A spring toothed harrow, followed with a brush drag does very effective work. Also a spike toothed harrow, a leveler or water will destroy many of the larvae and the non-hatched eggs. Quick and effective work means a large saving of alfalfa, for the worms not only will destroy the first crop, but also the second, and other green plants.

## UNION MINERS FIGHT AMONG THEMSELVES

**BUTTE I. W. W. DYNAMITE LABOR HOME.**

Montana City at Mercy of Agitators and Mayor, President of Western Federation Is Compelled to Flee For His Life—Militia Asked For.

At Butte, Mont., the members of the Industrial Workers of the World and the Western Federation of Miners, are engaged in deadly combat. One man has been killed, another fatally wounded, several hurt, and the miners' home building wrecked by I.W.W. dynamite. Chas. Meyer, president of the eastern Federation of Miners, has been compelled to flee in an automobile to save his life. Citizens are calling upon the governor of the state to bring in the militia, but the governor hesitates in this action as there are only five hundred militia in the state of Montana while five times that number are rioting in Butte. The present situation is that the I. W. W. are in complete control of the large mining city.

The police and the sheriff are powerless to resist the fury of the rioters, taking the position that their interference would cause far greater damage to life and property to attempt to prevent the self-anointed agitators from destroying life and property that comes under their displeasure.
