NIELSON RECOVERS LOAN

GIVEN JUDGMENT AGAINST COUNTY FOR TWENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS.

By a decision of Judge Chapman, on yesterday morning, Mr. Nielsen recovers the \$20,000 which he loaned to Carlson county on June 10, 1913.

The trial and argument of the case consumed the greater part of Monday, Tuesday and yesterday morning.

The county was represented by Attorneys C. C. McWhinney and L. O. Buffmann. Mr. Nielsen's attorneys were Bruffett, Erickson and King.

In his suit the plaintiff asked for the resumption of the original transaction and sought to recover mostly the \$20,000 without interest.

The court held that although the former commissioners had no authority to borrow this money, yet since the total debt limit had not been exceeded and since the commissioners were elected by the people and that the people could have voted the loan, therefore it would be inequitable for the county to retain the money.

COLORADO STRIKE OFF.

DENVER, Dec. 8.—The Colorado coal strike tonight was called off effective December 16th.

This action was taken by District No. 1 of the United Mine Workers of America by a unanimous vote after calling a meeting and ratifying the report of the international executive board introduced today recommending termination of the strike.

The action of the convention carries a recommendation of further efforts to unionize the mines of Colorado and to reduce the wage scale in the unorganized mines to the level of the scale paid by the large companies. This reduction amounts to 15 per cent.

MAY BE IN CINTAH.

There seems to be quite a strong probability that the town of Roosevelt is really in Uintah county instead of Duchesne. The *Vernal Express* of last week has the following to say regarding the matter:

"Nate Hughel, county surveyor of Uintah county, after a conference with the commissioners on Monday, left for Duchesne county to meet with Craig Hartman, the county surveyor of that county to take up the question of the line between the two counties."

"Official information received by

Mr. Hughel from Washington indicates that there is no question that Roosevelt is in Uintah county. According to this information, the 10th meridian, the boundary line between Cintah and Duchesne counties, is three-fourths of a mile west of the town of Roosevelt.

"As soon as Mr. Hughel has finished his work an official report will be published."

It has always been considered that Roosevelt was in Wasatch county until the county was divided and afterwards in the county of Duchesne. The point was brought up during the last campaign that there was a possibility that the town, which is the most highly developed in the reservation, was in reality in Uintah county, and, according to the records there are apparently good grounds for supposing that such is the case. To the event that it is so it would materially enhance the value of Uintah county from a taxable standpoint and at the same time detract from Duchesne county.
