NEW DOLLARS IN SIGHT FOR UTAH

Excellent Crops Throughout the State and An Unlimited Amount of Money With Which to Move Them.

Dividends from new dollars—money taken from the ground—will this year be the greatest in the history of the state of Utah, says Sunday's Herald-Republic. The new wealth that will be added to the state this year has been placed by various statisticians at between \$25,000,000 and \$30,000,000. The people of Utah, it is figured, are today earning more per capita than those of any other state in the union.

Persons who dig into figures have found that the mining industry this year will pay in excess of \$10,000,000 in dividends. The sheepmen will receive greater returns than ever before. Sugar is now bringing more for the state than in any year that sugar beets have been treated in the state. The farm products are also bringing good returns. In addition there is the fruit crop, the wool crop, live stock and many other industries that bring new money to the state. Harvests are bringing higher prices than in many years, live stock is high and chances are that the crops for Utah this year will be the greatest in history.

Per Capita Earning Large.

There is little doubt but what the new dollars industries—concerns that get their money from production from the ground—will this year pay more than has ever been witnessed in Utah. If this amount is placed at \$25,000,000, which is declared to be conservative, and counting that Utah has over 400,000 population, it means that the fleecive state is earning in excess of all expenses and overhead charges two hundred and fifty dollars each for every man, woman and child in the state. It is probable that no other state in the union can boast of such earnings.

Should the earnings of this state remain here for the upbuilding of the commonwealth it is figured it would be only a decade before Utah would rank as the greatest state as regards per capita earnings in the United States. As it is, more than half the money earned here goes to other states, it is said, to pay dividends on property owned here.

Boston Man's Views Given.

James F. Sheldon, financial editor of the Boston Journal and general manager of the Boston Financial News, who has been in Salt Lake City for several days looking over the financial situation and making a study of economic conditions, says that the West does not understand the East, and that on the other hand Easterners look on the Westerner as a faraway brother. "The farms of the East have been used up," he said, "and instead of Easterners rehabilitating them and conserving them as the Westerner has learned to do, they throw them aside, as it were."

UTAH'S SUGAR BEET CROP IN EXCELLENT CONDITION

Between six and seven hundred thousand tons of sugar beets will be the season's production for the Utah-Idaho Sugar company, according to a statement made by George A. Smith, purchasing agent, at Salt Lake City. Smith recently looked over the sugar beet industry in the two states and says the crops are in good condition, but that the total tonnage would be greater if the country had more rain. "The crop in Utah will be about normal," said Smith, "but in Idaho, where there has been more moisture, the tonnage will be more than last year by one-third. However, it is not too late to swell the tonnage in Utah, for it is possible that good rains may come before it is time to move the crop to the factories."

The total tonnage for the season usually averages more in Utah than in Idaho, Smith said, but on account of the extremely dry season it will not be practically normal. Sugar factories in both states, he believes, will commence operations two weeks earlier than last year. This is accounted for by the fact that owing to the dry weather the beets will ripen that much more quickly. Unless rains should set in, factories are expected to start about September 20th.

THE CROPS OF SOUTHERN UTAH ARE QUITE HEAVY

C. J. Ulrich, assistant state engineer, recently visited Washington, Iron and Beaver counties in company with W. D. Heers, state engineer. Heers is still in the southern part of the state, the purpose of checking up on contested water filings and inspection of roads. Crops are generally good in the southern counties, says Ulrich. Irrigated crops have suffered less from the drought than dry farm crops, but there is expectancy of a heavy harvest in both. Ulrich is high in praise of the work done by the agricultural college throughout the south. The expertiment farms scattered over the southern country are, in his opinion, proving of inestimable value to the farmers in lending assistance in the solution of problems that face them.

Utah Fruit Crop Short.

Utah fruits this year will demand a good price, according to W. H. Garvin, general manager of the Utah Fruitgrowers' association, who says that evidence of this already is in the fact that the crop in Utah would be below normal and the demand seems to be unusually heavy. FARMERS ARE HARVESTING GREATEST WHEAT CROP EVER

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 9.—American farmers are harvesting the greatest wheat crop ever grown in any one country. It may reach a billion bushels. Department of agriculture experts today estimated the crop at 950,000,000 bushels, basing their calculations on the condition of the crop August 1st. Bumper harvests of other cereals and food crops are indicated. The department of agriculture's August grain report, issued today, estimated the production of the country's leading crops as follows:

ward Taylor, state horticultural commissioner, "and you will find that the crop of apples promises to be at least 25 per cent of what it was last year. Last year the crop was unusually heavy and, of course, Salt Lake City is a dumping ground for the fruit left in other parts of the state. "The shortage in Utah county this year will make a big hole in the supply on which Salt Lake City dealers depend."

UTAH WHEAT CROP THIS YEAR IS RECORD BREAKER

There will be more wheat produced in Utah this year than ever before in the history of the state. In 1912, 642,000,000 bushels of wheat was grown on 265,000 acres and it was sold for \$4,444,400. Reports for last year show that 7,275,000 bushels of wheat was produced from 291,000 acres at a value of \$6,256,500. The winter wheat is rapidly being harvested, and while it is too early for official statistics, a crop of 8,750,000 bushels is the prediction of authorities. This increase is attributed to the fact that there is 20 per cent more land devoted to the cultivation of wheat now than there was last year. The prices to be asked in the world markets for wheat is a matter of much speculation, but it is estimated that \$7,500,000 will be the approximate value of Utah's wheat yield.

Wheat statistics compiled by the state and federal government in 1914 show that Utah has a yield averaging twenty-seven bushels to the acre, while the general average for the United States is fifteen bushels to the acre.

Water Low In Sevier River.

J. C. Dort, water commissioner of the Sevier, called last Friday on E. C. La Rue, engineer of the water resources department of the United States geological survey at Salt Lake City. Dort said the waters of the Sevier are lower than they have been for ten years, only 55 per cent of the normal flow, of two hundred and ninety-five second-feet being available for irrigation purposes. But for methods of conservation of moisture and timely rains, according to Dort, the crop losses in Sevier this year would have been enormous. Some damage to crops is reported, due to the shortage of water, but as a whole the consequences will not be serious.

Reservoir Saves Beets.

Abundant water from the Strawberry River reservoir has saved the best crops in Utah county this year, according to John F. Lant, agricultural superintendent for the Utah-Idaho Sugar company for the Payson district. Lant was in Salt Lake City the first of the week. "The normal flow was so light this year," he said, "that many farmers in the Spanish Fork district would have entirely lost their beets but for the Strawberry water." Beets in Utah county are in excellent condition, according to Lant, and a good best year is looked for there.

MORE EXTENSION WORK IS PLANNED BY TWO COUNTIES

LOGAN, Aug. 7.—E. G. Peterson, director of the extension division of the agricultural college, recently returned from a trip to Carbon and Emery counties, where he went to sign up new contracts with the county commissioners for the continued operation of Robert H. Stewart, county farm demonstrator. The commissioners of these counties proposed to appropriate more money for more extension workers just as soon as the extension division is ready to cooperate with them. Stewart is doing most satisfactory work among the farmers of these counties and because of the benefits derived from his efforts, the commissioners are anxious to employ more experts to aid Stewart in the promotion of better farming methods in their districts.

TEACHING REQUIREMENTS

New Bulletin Recently Made By the State Board of Education.

According to a decision of the state board of education last week, certificates hereafter will be granted only to such applicants as have completed one year of standard college or normal school work in addition to a completed high school course. Those in service now who have not completed such courses will be granted certificates on passing examinations in a prescribed reading course which will be outlined by the board. Teachers not in either of these classes may be given county certificates on passing examinations in such courses as the state department of education may direct. Holders of certificates whose examination records show no grade lower than seventy-five may renew their certificates on doing a certain amount of advanced work by passing examinations in outlined subjects. Four renewals by advanced work will entitle holders of county certificates to five-year state certificates and holders of five-year state certificates are entitled to receive life diplomas of grand grade on filing evidence of having taught successfully in the schools of the state five years.

JEREFOS RELEASED

Charged With Receiving the Earnings of Fallen Women.

Nick Jerefos, a Greek who was arrested at Bingham about four months ago by D. A. Plumly, United States immigration inspector, and charged with receiving the earnings of fallen women, was last Friday released by the department of justice at Washington. It was charged that Jerefos had established a number of women at Bingham and Price and deportation proceedings were commenced against him. Samuel A. King represented Jerefos in the deportation contest.
