HEALTH BOARD REPORTS.

According to the bulletin issued last Saturday by the Utah state board of health, San Juan, Washington and Wayne counties reported no deaths during September, although the same report shows there were nine cases of typhoid fever reported in San Juan and no deaths. In all of the seventy-five cases of typhoid reported from all over the state, nine were fatal. The total number of deaths reported for all causes was two hundred and sixty-three, only nine cases of smallpox and no deaths. There were nine deaths from tuberculosis.
