MEXICAN KILLED BY A PASSENGER TRAIN

While attempting to cross the Denver and Rio Grande tracks at the depot crossing at Price last Sunday night Alfonso Bason, aged 35 years, was struck by the engine of Passenger Train No. 2 at 4 instantly killed. Bason was waiting on the south side of the tracks for a west bound freight train to pass and having some friends standing on the north side, who were waiting for him, just as soon as the freight caboose passed him he started hurriedly to join his companions, not having noticed the approach of the passenger train. When he saw his danger he was too late to avert it and the train going at the rate of about twenty miles an hour hit him on the side and head. He was dragged a considerable distance by the engine.

Deceased, who came to this country about nine or ten years ago and has been employed on the farm of Peter Bernago, leaves a brother behind him in California.


