

SKILIRIS MAY BUILD UINTAH BRANCH

LABOR AGENT MAY CONTRACT TO DO THE WORK.

Surveys Under Way By the D. & R. G. From Two Points On the Main Line Into the Basin—Now Determining Grades From Price and Helper.

Surveys under way by the Denver and Rio Grande from two points on the main line of the road into the Uintah Basin may have results as far as the building of a railroad into that part of the state is concerned. It was learned last night that the Denver and Rio Grande has entered into a contract with L. G. Skliris, labor agent, to construct the road in the event that the Denver and Rio Grande decides to build, says Sunday's Herald-Republican.

J. B. Gwyn, chief engineer for the Denver and Rio Grande, is at the Hotel Utah, and says that the company has already completed surveys into the Uintah Basin. The work which the engineers are doing at this time is for the purpose of determining the best route.

For several years the company has had a survey through Provo Canyon by way of Heber City, but the engineers are now determining the grades from Helper, Price and Soldier Summit to the interior of the Basin. Population maps and tonnage maps have been prepared and soon will be in the hands of the operating and traffic departments.

Gwyn says the surveys now under way are to determine the grades and that he could not say what would be the result.

Shortly after the visit of E. L. Brown, vice president and in charge of operations of the Denver and Rio Grande, A. B. Apperson, general superintendent, and W. E. Wilkinson to the Uintah Basin, L. M. Purcell, L. G. Skliris and J. B. Ottenstein also made the trip. It was learned last night that Skliris purchased property in the vicinity of the towns where terminals and stations might be placed. The deeds have not all been delivered as yet, but the options and the contracts which were entered into by Skliris are said to be binding, and are being taken up.

Skliris would not comment on the story that he had purchased property along the proposed right of way and only smiled when questioned about the contract. The information that the land had been purchased and the contract made was gained from one of the party that accompanied Skliris on his trip. At the time it was reported that he had made inquiries as to what the different towns along the proposed route would do in the matter of granting bonuses, free rights of way and terminal facilities.

NOTICE TO WATER USERS.—State Engineer's Office, Salt Lake City, Utah, Oct. 11, 1915. Notice is hereby given that John P. Williamson, whose postoffice address is Salt Lake City, Utah, has made application in accordance with the requirements of the Compiled Laws of Utah, 1907, as amended by the Session Laws of Utah, 1909, 1911 and 1913, to appropriate five (5) cubic-feet of water per second from Beaver Creek, Carbon county, Utah. Said water will be diverted at a point which lies 328 feet north from the southeast corner of the southwest quarter of Sec. 7, Twp. 12 South, Range 8 East, Salt Lake base and meridian, and conveyed by means of a ditch for a distance of 12,000 feet and there used from January 1st to December 31st, inclusive, of each year, for coal mining purposes. After having been so diverted and used, the unconsumed part of the water will be returned to the natural channel of Gordon Creek, at a point 2188 feet west of the southeast corner of Sec. 21, Twp. 12 South, Range 8 East, Salt Lake base and meridian. This application is designated in the state engineer's office as No. 8215. All protests against the granting of said application, stating the reasons therefor, must be made by affidavit in duplicate, accompanied by a fee of \$2.50, and filed in this office within thirty (30) days after the completion of the publication of this notice. 
