PARDONS ARE GRANTED

Clemency Is Extended to Three Sentenced From Carbon County.

William King, serving an indeterminate sentence for burglary in the third degree, from Carbon county, obtained a commutation, effective December 20th.

TELEPHONE CONNECTION WITH VERNAL IMPROVED

Last Friday's Deseret Evening News brings this bit of local information: "A six-minute telephone connection was made this morning from this city with Vernal, a distance of two hundred and fifty miles, according to Sam H. Noel, commercial agent of the Mountain States Telephone company. Noel, with C. J. Noel, manager of the Utah Telephone company, H. G. Miller and J. Rex Miller, president and manager of the Eastern Utah Telephone company, who are in the city advising telephone conditions in the Utah Basin, expressed themselves as pleased with this morning's record. According to the telephone men up until the present time the connections with the Utah Basin have been so uncertain and so slow as to discourage the use of the lines for business purposes. Last week, however, the three companies completed a system of direct communication with Vernal and the whole Utah Basin, which they expect to prove of great service to local citizens and business men as well as the Utah people. The three companies assure the best of service to all personal and business calls."

CHARLES PULSIPHER, NAVY VETERAN, HAS PASSED AWAY

HUNTINGTON, Nov. 21.—Charles Pulsipher, who was one of the body-guard of the Prophet Joseph Smith, a member of the Nauvoo Legion, an early pioneer of Utah and a builder of more than twenty homes, died at Reno, November 19th, of old age and general debility.

At the time of his death he was a patriarch. He served as bishop of Huntington ward for many years and was one of the leading men in founding his town and county. His funeral will be held at Huntington, Monday, November 22d, at noon.

COURT DECIDES AGAINST MILNER

Litigation Over Title to Carbon County Lands May Go to Highest Tribunal—Points Similar to Issue In Sweet Case.

An order to suspend proceedings in all pending coal and mineral land cases until after definite settlement of the case of F. A. Sweet, administrator of the estate of Arthur A. Sweet, against the United States shall have been reached has been received by Attorney General Barnes, from the commissioner of the general land office at Washington, D. C. Barnes wrote the commissioner last Friday, acknowledging receipt of the order and expressing the willingness of his office to comply.

The order was given on receipt at Washington of request to take action in the case of William Francis Olson, petitioning for title to the Northwest Quarter of the Northeast Quarter of Section 16, Township 33 South, Range 9 East, Salt Lake base and meridian. The Olson case will be held up until decision in the Sweet case.

William Francis Olson is postmaster at Price and the suit referred to involves valuable lands (the townsite) at Storrs in Spring Canyon, commonly known as the Jesse Knight properties.

The government was given a favorable decision by the United States court of appeals in its suit against the estate of Stanley B. Milner and the Carbon County Land company, according to a telegram received at Salt Lake City last Friday by W. W. Ray, United States district attorney, from John D. Jordan of St. Louis, clerk of the circuit court of appeals. The suit involves title to 5564.23 acres of coal lands in Carbon county north and east of Price which the late Stanley B. Milner and his associates had contracted to purchase from the state. The suit brought by the government charged that the contracts under which title was to have passed from the state were secured through a scheme to induce officers of the state land board to select coal lands as grazing lands and certify them to the state as non-mineral in character.

Contention of the Government.

The lands, it is alleged, so selected were part of the million-acre grant made to the state by the enabling act, and the government contends that the enabling act excluded mineral lands. The complaint alleged that after expert geologists had cruised the Carbon county lands for Milner and found a valuable coal deposit underlying them, Stanley B. Milner, Harry O. Milner, Samuel H. Gilson and Truth A. Milner entered them as agricultural and grazing land and entered into contracts with the state to purchase them for \$1.50 per acre.

After the death of Stanley B. Milner the government brought suit against Truth A. Milner as executrix of his estate, Truth A. Milner, the Carbon County Land company which was interested in the lands, and Peter N. Campbell, to obtain title to them. In the trial court former Judge John A. Marshall decided in favor of the government and the Milners appealed. A. C. Milner, president of the Milner corporation, says that an appeal probably will be taken to the United States supreme court, but he could not tell for certain until he had seen a copy of the decision.

Milner Family May Appeal.

"There are several points in the case which the supreme court of the United States must work out," said Milner. "I do not regard this decision by the circuit court of appeals as being of particular importance, because it is my understanding that only a part of the issues were passed upon. In some respects this case is closely related to the Sweet case, and that decision will be of material aid to us. When the case was argued before our attorneys did not have that case to guide them. There are a number of points in this case which the government wants passed on by the United States supreme court and the government undoubtedly would have appealed had the decision been in our favor. While I have not yet seen the decision, I think it altogether provides that the case will go to the highest court in the land."

PIONEER MINER HEARTY AT EIGHTY; MINED FIRST GOLD IN WYOMING

ROCK SPRINGS, Wyo., Nov. 20.—Archibald Blair, who mined the first gold and first coal taken from the ground in Wyoming within historic times, last Friday celebrated his eightieth birthday at his home here. Scores of friends called to pay their respects and many congratulatory telegrams were received. Blair, despite his age, is hale and hearty and still takes a keen interest in industrial affairs.

It was in the spring of 1865, South Pass, that Blair and his brother made Wyoming's first gold discovery and, with a crude cradle constructed from split logs, washed gold dust from a gravel bar half a mile from Willow Creek, the nearest water. Subsequently a million dollars in gold was taken from the placers in that vicinity. In 1867, at Rock Springs, the Blair brothers again pioneered in the state's mineral industry, mining the first coal ever dug by white men in the state. In the intervening forty-eight years, Archibald Blair has seen the coal industry in the state grow to an annual production of seven million tons, while Rock Springs, where he first broke ground, has become the largest exclusive coal camp in the world.

Archibald Blair was born at Rothesay, Scotland, November 15, 1835. When he was 9 years of age his parents emigrated to Canada and he grew to manhood in the Dominion. In 1860 he was lured to California by the gold excitement, making the trip by way of Panama. In 1863 he and his brother, his inseparable companion, were in Oregon, and the following year they made a small fortune in mining near Pocatello, Ida. In 1865 their search for more gold took them to South Pass, Wyo., and two years later they arrived at the pony express station at which now is Rock Springs, where Archibald's wanderings ceased, for he since has made his home here.

The Blair boys built a shack near the pony express station maintained by Wells Fargo Express company, this station being where the No. 6 mine of the Union Pacific Coal company subsequently was sunk. Archibald Blair quickly observed the indications of coal which abounded in this district and before the end of 1867 had begun the first coal mining in the state at a point now known as Blairtown. In 1868 the Union Pacific railroad reached Rock Springs and over it Blair sent to Cheyenne the first shipment of Western coal ever handled by the road. For three years thereafter his mine supplied all the coal used by the Union Pacific.

Blair also was the pioneer ranchman of this section, in 1867 filing on what is known as "The Circle" ranch, twenty miles south of Rock Springs. The cattle and sheep which he bred there were among the first raised in Wyoming. In 1870 Blair was married to Miss Jane Macready in Canada and they since have resided here. They have but one child, Mrs. John W. Hay, wife of a prominent banker.
