**HE COMES BACK TO UTAH**

**W. N. Wetzel Given Superintendency of the Carbon Fuel**

W. N. Wetzel, former superintendent of mines for Utah Fuel company at Castle Gate and at Sannyside, is coming back to Carbon county. This from the Gloucester (O.) Press of Thursday, September 30th, tells the story: "A farewell banquet was given in the social rooms in the Methodist church on Tuesday night, honoring W. N. Wetzel of Athens, for the past fifteen months superintendent of mines for the Ohio Collieries company. During the short time he was in charge of mines for the local company Wetzel demonstrated that he is a thorough, practical mining man, while his fairness in all matters that came before him won the good will and esteem of employees.

"In going to his new and larger field of labor he takes the best wishes of many friends among the employees of the Ohio Collieries company." Wetzel got back to Salt Lake City the first of this month and has since been on the job at Rains. Here at Price last Monday he expressed himself as pleased to be in Utah once more and also with the salary, quite an inducement in his returning. **SUPREME COURT EXPLAINS**

**Reasons Given For Ordering School Tax Levy Here.**

Written decision of the supreme court of Utah, supplementing the oral decision made some days ago that the county commissioners of Carbon county should be ordered to provide a rate of 8.5 mills for school purposes, was handed down one day last week. The argument of Justice J. E. Frick, who writes the opinion, is that some effect should be given to a proviso in the state school revenue law hitherto not interpreted by the supreme court. The proviso occurs in the section which appears to limit the levy for school purposes to 5.5 mills for support and maintenance of the schools, and 15 mills additional to be used exclusively for the purchase of school sites and the erection of school buildings. The proviso adds:

"That the board of education in each county school district of the first class, shall also, on or before the first Monday in May of each year, furnish the board of county commissioners an estimate in writing of school funds needed in their districts for the ensuing year for the payment of teachers, of expenses of the county teachers institute and of compensation of the superintendent of schools."

Justice Frick goes into detail as to the history of this proviso and the section of the law in which it is contained. He concludes a long argument with the question: "Is it not more reasonable to assume that the legislature intended that this portion of the statute be given some force and effect, and that seven mills is not to be taken as an absolute and inflexible limitation?"

The decision further points out that to rule that the legal limit is seven mills would cause much confusion in many school districts of the state, both as to present and as to past school levies. It is pointed out that the levies in the different counties composing school districts for the year 1920 vary "all the way from three to fifteen mills."

The decision deals with the district school tax levy. There is pending before the people of the state a proposed constitutional amendment affecting the state school tax levy.

**UTAH SHALE MAY COME IN**

**Failure of the Petroleum Supply to Hasten Development.**

Shale fields of Northeastern Utah will likely be one of the important petroleum supply sources of the United States when the domestic oil production is insufficient to meet consumption requirements, David White, chief geologist of the United States geological survey, said a few days ago upon his arrival in Salt Lake City. White, accompanied by K. C. Hill, in charge of oil and gas field investigations for the geological survey, have inspected the oil shale regions of Colorado and Utah, and they plan to examine the shale areas of Wyoming.

"It will be remembered," said White, "that the United States geological survey is a pioneer in the examination of the oil shale regions of Colorado, Utah, Wyoming and Nevada with a view to their ultimate utilization as sources of supply for petroleum when the domestic oil production of the United States becomes insufficient to meet the consumption requirements of the country."

"The deposits here in Utah are tremendously important, equalling those of any other state in richness. It will appear that the principal great reserves of rich oil shale as yet examined are to be found in parts of Utah, Colorado, Wyoming and Nevada. I believe it will be no time at all until shale oil will be needed. Oil imported from Mexico during August for use in this country totaled ten million barrels. It is impossible to produce when the utilization of oil shale will be put on a commercial basis.

"There are many hopeful indications that oil shale may, at a relatively early date, be treated on a commercial scale, though it is not unlikely that additional time may elapse before discoveries as to retorting processes and experiments as to the best methods of refining will make possible the complete utilization of the distillate in the various forms."

Out of seven hundred and fifty-three farmers owning motor trucks in eleven Eastern States, who answered a recent query of the United States department of agriculture, 95 per cent said they believed the use of trucks would show a big profit. Preference leaned toward the ton truck. Bad roads were the principal drawback mentioned.

Sweet potatoes make a superior table and cooking syrup, say chemists of the United States department of agriculture. Thus far no large commercial use has been made of the discovery. The department is prepared to tell all how to make sweet potato syrup at home and how to use it in cookery and candymaking.

In 1920 six thousand acres of flax were cultivated in the United States, as against five thousand in 1919, the United States department of agriculture estimates. Wisconsin, Minnesota, Michigan and the Willamette Valley of Oregon lead in production. The 1920 crop is valued at \$1,600,000.


