Her Fortunate Situation the Foundation for a Commonwealth.

Natural Resources Sufficient to Capture any Home Seeker.

The location of a town has frequently more to do with its prosperity than the mineral, agricultural and other natural wealth in the immediate vicinity. Where the means of developing the natural resources are wanting or are contracted, the town depends upon its railway facilities and mercantile opportunities. Provo City is fortunate in both regards. Its railway facilities give it easy access to a very considerable territory and afford a means of distribution for manufactured wares and the products of its own mills and manufacturing establishments, as well as the agricultural and mineral products of the vicinity. Being only forty miles from Salt Lake City, and a distributing point for the various roads, with almost the same railway facilities, Provo City is enabled to handle her own products at a considerably reduced cost of transportation from mines, etc., to the main lines. The track is, doubtfully, the best situated base of the Wasatch Mountains on the west shore of Utah Lake, a beautiful body of fresh water with an area of 500 square miles. The lake is well stocked with fish, and in season is the haunt of ducks and other water-fowl. The sportsman will find this an excellent place for hunting and fishing, and the neighboring mountains afford additional and ample sport of the same nature. Provo City is well situated for a manufacturing city, as the raw material for smelting and kindred industries lie south of the town. Owing to the quantity and excellent quality of the fruit grown in the vicinity and the superior means of transportation for the carrying of fruit and vegetables bids fair to become a great industry. The water power in and around Provo is of the best, and is a decided feature in the economy of the various industries. The valley is fertile and the stocks luxuriant, so that grazing and stock-breeding are certain of a prosperous future. The climate is healthful, mild and uniform and nothing is wanting in nature, to build up a prominent commercial and manufacturing city. There is a wide field here which is rapidly being developed, and the certainty of success is an established fact, for, possessing all the natural advantages of equally fortunate places in Utah, it has the additional advantages of superior railway facilities. This is a good place for investments, and visitors are accorded a hearty welcome at all times. The commercial and manufacturing interests are under the supervision of the Board of Trade, and the material interests are zealously looked after and guarded.

WATERWORKS FOR MIDWAY.

MIDWAY, Wasatch Co., Utah, March 18.-Last night the Board of Directors of the Midway Irrigation Company, C. L. Bronson president, held an important meeting, at which lawyer Hontz, of the Provo firm of King & Hontz, gave valuable legal advice as to the best ways of getting the organization on a safe basis, free from all risky entanglements, by some amendments in the articles of incorporation.

In the afternoon of the same day, a public meeting was held in which it was resolved to carry out a plan of ward establishing a system of water works to cover the town, furnishing clear and pure aqua for all domestic purposes. The total cost of the undertaking is roughly estimated at \$5,000.

The following were appointed a committee of preliminary inquiry: Alva J. Alexander, Ulrich Buehler, John Watkins, Jr., Ulrich Probst and Godfrey Boehler. There appears an earnest determination to go ahead with this great undertaking.

THE Boston Lumber Company is the name of a new firm about to start business in this city. The yard is situated on Second Street, between 1 and J, the company having leased a piece of ground from Reed Smoot. Mr. F. M. Boston & Brothers are the proprietors, and intend carrying a stock of first class building material; everything in the lumber and building line will be found at their place. This means work for men this next summer. Mr. Boston is an experienced lumber man, a native of Canada, but recently from Nebraska.

LAST Sunday night some maliciously inclined boys at Springville placed a large coal oil tank on the track near the depot in that city. The tank was placed across the track and a plank run from it to the tank. The intention was to do some injury to the first train. OGDEN DEMOCRATS.

The New York "Sun" Comments Their Platform.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 18.-The Sun devotes its principal editorial today to a characteristic review of the platform recently adopted by the Weber county Democrats. The editorial commences in this fashion: "Here is some good, sound Democracy, though it comes all the way from Utah. The Democracy of Weber county in that territory lately adopted a platform of which this is the essential part."

The Sun then prints the platform in full, and adds: "The sixth resolution is one that the Democratic party has needed badly in recent years and may need again. Belief in the cardinal principles of Democracy makes a man a Democrat. To make his belief on temporary, accidental, or non-political questions the test of his Democracy is to put the non-essential before the essential. In selecting a candidate for office close consideration must be given to all his qualifications and disqualifications, but every man is a Democrat who subscribes to the fundamental articles of Democracy. In the last few years there has been a furious effort on the part of the free traders to read out of the party every protectionist Democrat. It is a queer way of strengthening a party, to drive people out of it because they will not worship its hobby or that. The Weber county plan is the better one." - Herald.
