New Jersey Women Cannot Vote. Chief Justice Beasley gave an opinion on June 11 in which he declares it the sense of the supreme court of New Jersey that women cannot vote in the state. The decision is a general one, and while it applies to all attempts of women exercising rights of franchise under statutory provisions it is a decision rendered in connection with the election of road commissioner in Bergen county. The contest was made because at the general town meeting the chairman of the assembly said that under the statute all persons of full age, whether men or women, who reside and own property in the township and district, should be permitted to vote, and because women did vote, and by these votes of the fair sex Commissioner Blake was placed in power.—Trenton Dispatch.
