MRS. COON'S SAD CASE

Further Particulars of How and Why the Destitute Woman and Her Family Came to Provo.

The life of Mrs. Coon, the lady from Sandy whose later destination was referred to in these columns yesterday, was despaired of last night, but efficient medical aid, kind help and good nursing brought her through the night alive and with signs of improvement.

Marshall Knight in the early evening found her suffering untold agonies, writhing in pain caused from convulsions of the stomach, and so burning up with fever that her tongue and mouth were blistered. The city physician had given in frictions that she should be given nothing to eat for at least twenty-four hours, but some kind hearted neighbors in his absence had insisted that she eat a little toast, and the poor sufferer paid for the luxury dearly.

The minister took Mrs. Knight to the woman's bedside and with hot cloths applied and other services done the sufferer's pains were eased some. A nurse was procured and the doctor sent for. Neighbors gave the poor lady clean bedding and night clothes, a mattress of straw was procured and she made comparatively comfortable and easy. This morning food and provisions for the family were procured and they will be taken good care of pending an investigation which is now going on to ascertain whether she is properly a ward of Ppovo city, Utah county, Salt Lake county or Sandy city. It is understood that she has some relatives in Pleasant Grove, but she is too weak and sick to give full particulars intelligently.

Mrs. Coon's case is a peculiarly and one and her greatest fear seems to be that her husband will be allowed to come near her. From her rambling story it would seem that she walked all the way from Sandy here, carrying her baby, fleeing from her husband, she walked back again to be with her other children, and the section men at Sandy placed her and her children and few

effects on the train and paid her way this far. During all this time she did not get sufficient nourishment and her children, other than her babe, three boys and a girl, were allowed to run wild, and until this morning were in a most filthy condition. Plenty of soap and water, and willing hands, together with some new clothes donated, have made them appear as they should again. They had not had food enough to eat until this morning and were also ravenously hungry. Flour and other provisions had been supplied them but the little girl knew not how to cook them.

At present, mother and children are as comfortable as it is possible for them to be under the circumstances.
