FROM Spanish Fork this morning comes the news of a sad accident that occurred there last evening between 6 and 7 o'clock, just before the big rain and thunder storm came up. The four children of Mrs. Davis, widow of Ephraim Davis who died at a hospital in Salt Lake, some four weeks ago while undergoing an operation to gether with the 15-year old son, Wilford, of Mr. Hallam, who rented Mrs. Davis's farm were playing in the granary which is situated near the Rio Grande Western depot. Considerable wheat had been stored in the upper story of the granary. While the children were playing, the joists supporting the floor of the upper story gave way and broke, the wheat coming down and completely covering the children. The Hallam boy was severely bruised about the head and one knee was injured seriously. One of the Davis boys had his thigh broken. All of the children were black in the face from suffocation when taken from the wheat and much bruised as there was considerable timber and boards among the wheat. Four of the children were gotten out and the workers thought they were all, but Mrs. Davis insisted that one other of her children was buried in the wheat.
