### THE CUBAN WAR.

It Has Ended, To The Relief Of All.

#### CLEVELAND'S INTERVIEW

With De Lome Greatly Pleased the Cubans—Railways to be Built and Rebuilt—General Revival—Two More New York Papers for Free Silver.

NEW YORK, May 8.—A special from Havana to a morning paper says:

The end of the war is at hand. The rumor permeated the city joyously last night, and now it is confirmed in all well informed circles. Prices at the bourse have risen. The chiefs of the insurgents have abandoned their cause in despair.

Captain-General Martinez Campos has ordered that the works on the port of Santiago be begun at once. Railways and telegraph lines are to be built, rebuilt and improved through Manzanillo, Bayamo, Puerto Principe, Santa Cruz, San Luis, and Soriano.

President Cleveland's cordial interview with Senor Dupuy de Lome, the Spanish minister, is reported by news papers here and causes great enthusiasm among the people. This is discernible in the loud applause which greets the report that the Spanish government has ordered a diminution of tax rates on all the industries and railways in Cuba.

TWO MORE FREE COINAGE PAPERS. WASHINGTON, D. C., May 8.—Senator Stewart, Bryan, of Nebraska, and others prominently identified with the new silver party, are casting about for a newspaper organ to advocate silver coinage in the east. They attempted the purchase of the New York Mercury, but its proprietor asked \$250,000 for it, which was considered too much. The negotiations have now been renewed, and John P. Miller and Major Thomas B. Kirby, Washington newspaper men, have come to Montana in the interest of the Mercury, to try and induce Marcus Daly to put up a big sum of money for its purchase.

The New York Morning Journal, having been bought by John R. McLean, of the Cincinnati Enquirer, will be converted into a free coinage paper.

#### The Grand Concert.

The program for Saturday evening's concert to be given in the stake tabernacle is a varied one and one that is bound to please all tastes. The tabernacle choir has prepared two grand march choruses, with elegant and elaborate accompaniments for orchestra and organ. The Latin and Spanish Fork choirs will each contribute a selection, and the tabernacle choir male voice chorus, will again be heard in the soul-stirring glee, "Comrades in Arms." A fine male quartette, "May Breezes," selected from the German, is being studied for the occasion by the Boshard and Pyne brothers, while the solos are in the hands of Mrs. May Young, Miss Emma John and Mr. Johnathan Backley.

The clarinet solo of Professor Gillman is almost an entirely new feature on a concert program in Provo, as only once before has this fine solo instrument been heard at our concerts. Notwithstanding every number on the program is in good hands and being thoroughly prepared, the grand feature of the evening will be the organ selections by Professor J. J. Daynes of Salt Lake. The resources of tone, expression, and variety of combinations in a grand organ are almost limitless, as the various stops are imitations of the orchestra, with all of its different combinations and tone color. In the hands of a master, wonderful effects can be produced by skill and manage-

ment in the manipulation of the stops in bringing out orchestral effects, which places the organ on the throne as king of all instruments.

Saturday night's concert will be a feast that every citizen of Provo should partake of. Fill the tabernacle on Saturday night. We need the organ. The proceeds go to the organ fund.
