THE COUNTY COURT.

MEETS AS A BOARD OF CAN- VASSERS.

Votes of Utah County Canvassed and Official Result Announced—Petitions Considered and Claims Allowed.

The board of county commissioners met Monday morning in pursuance of adjournment, with all members present. The following business was transacted:

Fred Carter appealed for a segregation of personal property from real estate; referred to county attorney.

Committee from Second ecclesiastical ward of Provo presented petition to the effect that Mrs. Anna Widmark and son Joseph, aged 16 years, were in a pitiable condition, starving, except what was received from the county, \$2 per month, and asked that some person be appointed guardian by the district court and that married daughters in Salt Lake be communicated with. Referred to Commissioner Bullock for investigation and report.

Mrs. Epsy Pace of Provo asked for assistance and remittance of taxes on account of age and inability to work. Referred to Commissioner Bullock with power to act.

Thos. Taylor and Provo Commercial & Savings Bank sales ordered to be reported as erroneous by county treasurer.

Andrew Swenson of Pleasant Grove, through Commissioner Bullock, asked for assistance from the county on account of sickness from typhoid fever and inability to secure help or medical treatment. Referred to Commissioner Bullock.

Catherine D. Jones asked that the county make survey of road running through her land in southwest quarter, section 19, and northwest quarter, section 30, township 6, south of range 3 east, Salt Lake meridian, as she wishes to build fences at proper lines. Taken under advisement.

Harry Crane of Provo asked assistance on account of epilepsy and inability to work; endorsed by County Physician Allen. Taken under advisement.

Jonathan Mechem applied for segregation of taxes on account of block 86 "C," Provo, having sold same in September and not owning same now. Denied.

At 12 o'clock noon the board resolved itself into a board of county canvassers: J. O. Bullock, chairman.

On motion of A. M. Davis, election returns were ordered opened by the clerk by cities and towns in alphabetical order.

Recess taken to 2 p.m.
In the afternoon returns were canvassed for the following precincts: Alpine; American Fork, 1, 2 and 3; Benjamin; Clinton; Cedar Fort; Goshen; Highland; Fairfield; Lehi, 1, 2 and 3; Lake View; Lake Shore; Mapleton; Manning; Provo, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8. Adjourned to Tuesday at 10 a.m.

Pursuant to adjournment the county court met Tuesday to resume the canvass of the county vote. All members were present.

The vote of the remaining districts were canvassed as follows: Payson, 1 and 2; P. V. Junction; Provo Bench; Springville, 1, 2, 3 and 4; Spanish Fork, 1, 2, 3 and 4; Santaquin; Salem; Spring Lake; Thistle; Tucker and Vineyard.

Resolution passed that the votes were canvassed and that the candidates received majorities which are enumerated on another page of this issue.

Death by Exposure.

Last Saturday a man was found lying in the field south of the cemetery and was taken to the house of Bud Hedberg. Dr. Allen was called and administered treatment, but the man died the next morning. The remains were taken in charge by Graham & Jones and were buried yesterday. It now transpires that the name of the deceased was Daniel Seber, that he had a wife and two children in Victor, Cal., that he was in destitute circumstances and died of exposure.

Will Soon be in Provo.

Each extinguisher, before being sent out, is tested to 450 pounds hydraulic pressure. They make, also, apparatus suitable for villages, towns and cities, and have an equipment for large buildings, mills and factories that is unequalled in fire fighting qualities. The superiority of this apparatus may be inferred from the fact that the United States government has recently given an order aggregating over \$300,000, for this make, the chief consideration in making the award being efficiency for the purposes required. It is also endorsed by such firms as Sprague, Warner & Co., Goodville & Goodville, and a number of leading lumber and brewing companies of Chicago and elsewhere. The State agency is represented by N. H. Mix, who expects to call on our citizens soon with samples of extinguishers and photographs and specifications of the larger apparatus. We would advise our citizens not to place their orders for anything of the kind until they have seen this apparatus.
