On an examination of the record of the Weiser school board find they have exceeded the limit of indebtedness they are allowed to incur for school purposes. They intended to issue bonds to the amount of \$8,000 for the purpose of building a brick school house. The limit of indebtedness is 4 per cent of the taxable property. The assessment roll for 1887 fixes the value of the property in the district at \$106,928, which would allow the incurring of \$4277.12 indebtedness. The matter will probably rest for another year.
