Idaho Voters Must be Registered.

The present law requires all male inhabitants over twenty-one, citizens of the United States, who have resided in the territory four months and in the county thirty days to be registered if they expect to vote.

The Board of county commissioners appoint the registrar before August 1st, who must be a justice of the peace and qualified elector, and if there are none such in the precinct, then any qualified voter.

The time for registration in 1888 is every Saturday between August 15th and the day of election, with the exception of the last Saturday preceding election.

He has refused his assent to laws the most wholesome and necessary for the public good. He has caused the enactment of laws which have opened the sluice ways of destruction, pouring forth upon the people of this land a dreadful tide of intemperance, with all the attendant evils of drunkenness, disease and death.

He has bribed in various ways, and under various disguises, the legislators, the judges and the jurists of the country, to prevent the enactment and the execution of laws however needful for the welfare of the public.

He has taken away our property, earned by patient, faithful labor and reduced our families to beggary and want.

He has diverted the wealth of the nation from its proper office to the support of the criminal, the pauper, and the idiot, caused to become such by his blighting influence.

He is responsible, directly or indirectly, for three-fifths of all crimes committed, and four-fifths of all murders done.

He has dragged down the gifted and noble of all classes from positions of honor, and consigned them to a drunkard's grave and a drunkard's doom.

He has prostituted the public press to his purposes and uses, so that, too often, instead of nobly speaking out for justice and right, and the good of the people at large, it basely yields to his demands, and is sustained in his efforts to crush and ruin our race.

BURNED TO DEATH.

Two Miners Meet a Horrible Death in a Burning Building.

George Powell arrived here from Banner Sunday evening with the startling news that the Elmira company's boarding and lodging house, at the Banner mine, caught fire at half-past three o'clock that morning, and that Mike McCullough and Con. Bumgardner lost their lives. It is not known how the fire originated.

Twelve miners were sleeping up stairs. The smoke boiling up from below first awakened Con. Bumgardner, who gave the alarm and awakened the others. Bumgardner and McCullough went down stairs to make their escape, and were soon followed by Thos. Faulk, who tried the door but could not open it, it being tightly closed, probably by the settling of that portion of the building. As soon as he found it could not be immediately opened he made a lunge for the window, four or five feet from the door, and made his escape. He called to the men above not to come down—that they could not make their escape. There were two windows up stairs, and the men made their escape through them and jumped to the ground, a distance of twelve or fifteen feet. Mr. Faulk did not see McCullough and Bumgardner when he went down stairs, so dense was the smoke. It is thought that they, not having the presence of mind exhibited by Mr. Faulk, kept working at the door until they suffocated. The bodies, or what remained of them, were found in the ruins near the location of the door. The arms and legs were burned off, the bodies burned to a coal, and about half of one skull, supposed to be that of McCullough, was burned up. None of the men were hurt in making their escape except Faulk. In jumping through the window one hand and a leg were cut by glass. The miners lost quite a sum of money in the fire.

Miss Pillsbury, who had charge of the boarding house, luckily stopped with one of her lady friends that night.—Idaho City World.

IDAHO POLITICS.

Aspiring Candidates for Territorial Honors Grooming for the Fall Races.

Fred. Dubois, Republican, the present Delegate to Congress, will very likely receive a re-nomination from his party. He is justly popular with the masses of his party, but the wise pullers and fine workers are against him.

Prominent among those on the Democratic side seeking the nomination for Delegate, is Hon. Jas. H. Hawley, U. S. District Attorney for Idaho. As in Mr. Dubois' case, Mr. Hawley's ambition does not meet with enthusiastic support among the bosses and sack workers.

Hon. John M. Burke, of North Idaho, has also signified his willingness to contest for the nomination for Delegate before the Democratic convention. Mr. Burke has promulgated his platform in advance. He declares himself as being opposed to free land.

It is also rumored that the Knights of Labor have got a candidate in the embryo.

Why is it there has been no second to Jud. Boyakin for Delegate? Is it because he carries no sack and is an honest man?

TWO TO HANG.

The Bingham County Murderers to Hang Next Month.

Judge Broderick in the District Court at Blackfoot, last week, departed from the time-honored custom of naming Friday as hangman's day in fixing the date for the execution of Woods and Williams on Saturday July 21st.

Another case of the law's delay is noted in this case. Although these murderers were sentenced to be hung on July 22d, 1887, they have by simply taking advantage of the law's delay, been able to stay the execution for one year.

Better nine guilty men should suffer a strong sentiment, but such dilly-dallying with justice as in the case cited, is one of the greatest incentives for that other unpardonable crime—mob law.

What moral effect will this execution have at this late day? Aside from the satisfaction it will afford a few of the relatives of the murdered, the general public will view the execution with mingled disgust and curiosity. Whatever moral sentiment was outraged by these murders has been in part or wholly dissipated by the long time intervening between sentence and execution, to say nothing of two almost successful attempts to escape and the heavy bill of jail expenses.
