Campaign Speeches Come High But Dear People Must Have Them - The Campaign Is the Best.

The managers of the Democratic oratorical bureau are having difficulty to meet the demands for Mr. Thurman. It was the intention to have him speak in only the four doubtful states outside of Ohio, but states like Michigan, that give small republican majorities, have made such urgent demands that the national committee has had to give way.

The pay of speakers is estimated on their supposed influence, and for that reason a speaker identified with a certain class of voters is usually given the largest fees. It was for that reason that Alexander Sullivan of Chicago, who was strong with Irish-Americans, received the largest pay for his services during the campaign of 1884 from the republicans.

For the Assembly our respected fellow-townsmen, Hon. D. L. Badley, is seeking and is worthy a re-nomination. C. R. Smith of Dixie, is also in the field. The friends of Hon. A. Feuch of Star, are pushing his name as one of the lucky trio. As Ada county is entitled to three Assemblymen, there is room for several more entries in this class.

For Probate Judge the names of Ben. Prickett and Silas W. Moody, of Boise City, are "in the hands of their friends." John S. Gray would like to be re-nominated for District Attorney. Edgar Wilson, of Boise, is his only competitor. Sam. Mann is supposed to have the inside track for Auditor and Recorder, while Chas. Kingsley, incumbent, also think they are in sight of the promised land.

It is said that Rev. Flenner of the Statesman, is nursing McConnell's little boomlet. The Rev. never forgets his friends! For Sheriff Dave Heron and Rube Robbins are both ambitious. For the remaining offices the candidates are plentiful but modest.

As to the Democrats: They have not fixed upon the date for their convention, and consequently the candidates are as yet in the embryo. "What Eastern railroad will you connect with when your road gets east of the mountains, Mr. Hoag?" THE OLD, OLD STORY. Vice President Hoag Tells His Time. -Some New Variations. Portland Daily News, Aug. 30. Wm. M. Hoag, Vice President and General Manager of the Oregon Pacific railroad, arrived from Corvallis yesterday and is at the Holton House. In the evening a News man had a chat with Mr. Hoag as follows: "How much of the road do you intend to finish this season, Mr. Hoag?"

"It is the intention to complete every mile that can be till stopped by the storms of winter. Contracts have been let up to the tunnel, for a distance of forty-six miles from the present end of the road, which will make the total length of the road some 150 miles. On Saturday next the contract for the 400-foot tunnel will be let. It is the intention to endeavor to have this tunnel finished in as short order as possible. The reason for this is that if the fall is a late one, that we may build beyond the tunnel for some distance this season."

"Men to the number of between 600 and 700 are now at work on the several contracts, and in a short time 2000 men will be at work. We received a number of Italians from the north yesterday, and more are expected in a day or two, and men have come from San Francisco. So the line of the road presents a scene of great activity. This activity will be unabated until the snow stops operations."

"In the spring, at the earliest possible moment, work will be resumed and pushed in the year 1889 as fast as men and money can do the work."

Judge Beaty of Caldwell, while not outspoken in his candidacy for Auditor and Recorder, can rally support for that position any time.

The developments of the next week will probably bring out the "unterrified" in large numbers, and The Tribune, true to its determination to give all the news, will undoubtedly give them an airing.

Advices from Grant county, Oregon, report that Lake Malheur, a body of water that covers more than 75 square miles, and has been without an outlet, is rushing through a subterranean passage with a great roar. The noise is so loud and the shrinkage so great as to attract much attention. It is said that miles of formerly submerged land are now visible. It is connected with Lake Harney by a shallow channel sixty feet wide and 600 feet long. If the subsidence prove permanent it may throw the Oregon Pacific survey some miles farther south.
