Congress adjourned last Wednesday.

The McKinley tariff bill became a law before Congress adjourned.

It is notable that all farming precincts went democratic. They won't be fooled always by smooth republican orators.

Eighty-one straight democratic votes rolled out of the ballot box in Caldwell precinct last Wednesday night when the count began.

The total registration of Caldwell precinct was 272. The vote almost reached the total registration. Over fifty registered on election day.

Edward Nugent, democrat, has been elected Judge of this district by a good majority. Chas. M. Hays, of Silver City, is probably elected District Attorney.

The Democrats elect all three of the county commissioners. Jim. Lusk got thirty majority in Boise district. The other two districts went democratic last election.

Col. John R. French of the Boise is dead. He expired suddenly Thursday afternoon whilst engaged at his desk. We regret that we are unable at this writing to give an extended review of his life and services. During his short residence in this State—about two years—he did much for Idaho.

Two days before the election Fred Dubois had U. S. Marshal Joe Wilson removed and A. L. Richardson appointed in his place. Mr. Wilson's friends claim that he was removed because he was not active in supporting Dubois for U. S. Senator and also because he refused to coerce the Mormon vote.

The saloons were all kept open yesterday. This caused considerable of a stir among temperance folks, who instituted a search in the law book with the intention of having the saloon keepers arrested. Attorney General Johnson and District Attorney Wilson were consulted and both said there was no law now in effect in regard to saloons being closed on election day. About three years ago the laws were revised and the section relating to this matter was omitted.—Boise Sun, Oct. 2nd.
