The State local Prohibition
law was endorsed by the peo-
ple and put squarely on the
statute book of that great Pa-
cific commonwealth by a popular majority
of over 2,000 votes! The Prohibition al-
ready announced with an average gain of
at least 50 per cent throughout the State,
nearly 300 per cent increase for Multnomah
alone. Score so much to aggressive
party agitation through organization and
the new privilege of direct legislation
through the initiative and referendum.
Oregon has the proud distinction of win-
ning the first statewide victory in the way
of temperance legislation by popular vote
since North Dakota was admitted in 1889.
May Oregon be wise in selecting her offi-


