## RECLAMATION TO BE PUSHED

He, also, asserts that those who are "not in sympathy" with this effort to disrupt both old parties "are neither good citizens nor good Democrats." This is a challenge that the opponents of the American party idea will be quick to accept as a reflection upon their citizenship that they will resent at the polls most effectively. Are the moral characters of the men closely seconding Dubois in this movement so spotless and their records for civic cleanliness so pure that they desire

the campaign shifted to this issue? Are men and women who oppose the injection of religious questions into politics, and would discourage strife and contention between the different sections of the State to rest under the imputation that they are "not good citizens?" Mr. Jackson raises these issues and he will find the plain, sober, thinking people of all parties and all creeds ready to accept battle upon his chosen lines. "For the honor and integrity of Idaho, at home and before the world," should be the slogan of a united opposition to the mad efforts of the Dubois State wreckers and character defamers?—Capital News, Sept. 17.

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## TO LIFT PRICES

### New Plymouth Farmers Decide to Join Hands and Pull Together

## A MOVE IN RIGHT DIRECTION

### The Primary Object is to Advertise Their Hay—The Idea of Co-operation may be Extended.

Twenty-five of our representative hay men around New Plymouth met at Creasey's hall last Monday night to discuss methods by which they might unite to sell their crop of hay at a good figure. The plan accepted was to tax each man interested one cent per ton to create an advertising and solicitor's fund. With this money the hay will be advertised for sale at a certain price at different points over the country, with the special conveniences for winter feeding, etc., to attract the attention of owners of large herds of sheep and other stock. W. F. Ringer, who was elected canvasser, lists the hay for sale and acts as an agent in bringing the buyer and seller together. This is co-operation on the right line, and if the system was more generally adopted among the farmers they could command a just price for every product that they raise. The farmers must keep organized if they would protect themselves in the matter of prices on what they produce.—New Plymouth Outlook.

W. H. Richards of Nampa was in Caldwell Wednesday. Many of Mr. Richards' friends have been urging him to accept the Republican nomination for the legislature. At first he refused to even consider it but finally said that he would accept the nomination. Mr. Richards is a substantial and trustworthy man. He is a man of experience and would be capable of doing much good for his constituency.

H. N. Maxey went to Boise Wednesday evening feeling sure that he would receive the nomination for sheriff at the hands of the Republican convention. Mr. Maxey has thoroughly canvassed the situation and should be familiar with the conditions. The Pleasant View correspondent of the Payette Independent says: Diphtheria has appeared in our community but it is sincerely hoped that the doctors will be able to keep it in control. Two cases have been reported. One a little boy living in the southeast district and the other a member of a family camping in the orchard on the Whitney ranch. Antitoxine has been administered and all danger is considered over by the county physician.

Monday's Capital Evening News says: Charles P. Hatley of Caldwell was in town yesterday. He is operating a fruit packing house at Caldwell and one at Emmett. He said the prune crop in the Lower Boise and Payette valleys is turning out fully up to the average. The thinning out of the fruit by late frosts had a rather beneficial effect, he thought. Mr. Hatley said his firm had shipped 6 cars of pears and prunes from Emmett and expected to ship from 15 to 20 more. From Caldwell they had shipped two of pears and five of prunes and he thought they would have 25 more cars of prunes and apples to ship from that section. They had also shipped two cars of fruit from Nampa and would probably ship 7 or 8 more before the season closed.
