### Chicago Market Letter.

Cattle—The big run of cattle which dealers have been anticipating since the close of the strike materialized today with 32,000 on sale. Between 7,000 and 8,000 of these were westerns, which ruled 10 to 15 cents lower in sympathy with the much larger decline in all classes of corn-fed stock below choice. Our sale for the Fox Cattle Co. of 110 Dakotas averaging 1,357 pounds at \$4.65, for export, is the highest reported at this writing. We also sold for the same company 60 head averaging 1,238 pounds at \$3.95, and 42 head averaging 1,286 pounds at \$3.90. Our other sales included the following: For the Harris Franklin Co., 256 Dakota-Texans, 1,150 pounds, \$3.85; Thos. Moran, 62 Montanas, 1,204 pounds, \$3.86; Matador Lana & Cattle Co., 43 Dakota-Texans, 1,136 pounds, \$3.80; 56 heifers, 1,011 pounds, \$3.50; Western Ranches, 224 Dakota-Texans, 1,150 pounds, \$3.65. We also handled a number of smaller lots at prices ranging from \$3.60 to \$3.90. Although there were few choice rangers on sale general quality of the offerings was fair to good. The sharp decline in native cattle today will have a tendency to check receipts and we look for the market to recover. We can see nothing to be gained by holding back range cattle that are destined for market this season and we advise forwarding them as fast as convenient.

Sheep—This week opened with a big run of sheep and lambs numbering 40,000 the bulk of which were westerns. The proportion of thin feeding stock was very large and trading on that class was a little slow as a consequence, prices ruling steady at 10 cents lower. Fat lambs declined 10 to 15 cents, while desirable fat western wethers and ewes held about steady. The best westerns on sale were 8 doubles of Idahos for the Wood Live Stock Co., the top cut selling at \$5.30 which was considered 15 cents lower than they would have brought on last Friday. Two doubles of prime black-faced Montana yearling ewes

sold for breeders at \$4. Best fat western wethers brought \$3.85 to \$3.90. The market has good healthy tone there being an excellent demand for all classes, but we do not look for any particular advance in the near future as supplies are bound to be liberal for some time to come. The picturesque personality of Thomas W. Lawson is well to the fore in the October issue of Everybody's Magazine. Not satisfied with the allowance of space given to his "Frenzied Finance" in the body of the magazine, he has burst the bonds of editorial convention and appropriated several pages in the advertising section, part of which he uses to reply to the scores of letters and inquiries which his remarkable articles have brought him. He deals with his critics in much the same spirit he handles the financiers—without gloves. Incidentally, the October issue of Everybody's is 550,000; the issue of September was 425,000, and a second edition had to be printed.

The October instalment of "Frenzied Finance" is devoted to John Edward O'Sullivan Addicks, thru whom Mr. Lawson first encountered Standard Oil and H. H. Rogers. There is nothing mild or conventional about his description of the of the Delaware statesman. It is a terrific and ruthless indictment of the man and his methods, supported by specific details and incidents, and set forth with the same vivid art which characterized the study of H. H. Rogers in an earlier number. The description of Addick's capture of Boston and its gas companies is one of the most grimly humorous and entertaining pictures Mr. Lawson has yet given.

Otherwise, Everybody's is as timely and entertaining as ever. The several articles are all about topics decidedly before the public at the moment. The flying machine contest is on at St. Louis, and we have here "Flying Up To Date"—a simple statement of the problems which Langley, Santos

Dumont, Maxim, and Professor Bell are striving to solve.

Lindsay Denison describes how "The Fight for the Doubtful State" is conducted. Paul Severing tells of the great chess champions now battling for supremacy at the World's Fair.

In the harvest month it is interesting to see and read "Harvesting the World Over," by Will Irwin, of course plenteously illustrated.

There are eight short stories besides a vital instalment of Hal Caines "Prodigal Son," which grows more powerful as the plot develops.
