College of Idaho Closes a very Successful School Year.

The fourteenth annual closing exercises of the Academy of the College of Idaho, occurred this week. The past year has been the most successful in the history of the college, both in good work and attendance. Up to date 107 young men and women have been graduated from this most excellent institution. The college is keeping pace with the country in every respect. The regular collegiate course will be added next year making the institution a college in fact as well as in name.
