Most of the sub-contracts for grad-

ing are for sixty days and under this plan the work is being rushed to early completion."

Congressman French Eager for Debate.

Moscow, Idaho, July 9.—Congressman Burton L. French of Idaho today sent a letter to Chief Forester Gifford Pinchot challenging him to a joint debate. Mr. French said that this challenge was drawn out by an interview of Mr. Pinchot's about the forestry meeting at Wallace. In his letter Congressman French says:

"I was invited to be in Wallace on the day of the meeting by Secretary Garfield in a personal letter to me. I responded, and in the afternoon prior to the meeting, the Wallace arrangement committee invited me to make a short address of not less than ten or twenty minutes. I acceded to this request and the committee placed me first upon the program in order that the evening might be left for you and Secretary Garfield. In the time at my disposal I outlined very briefly my opposition to certain features of the forestry service. You followed me with an address of about three-quarters of an hour on the leading features of the forestry question, and, from your interview, with much satisfaction to yourself, certainly with much delight to me and I believe to the audience.

"In view, however, of your interview, which has been given great publicity, I shall be glad to discuss the forestry question with you at Wallace, Idaho, on any date that can be agreed upon. It is my desire that the meeting for such discussion occur at the earliest possible date. Should you, by prior arrangement of program, be unable to be at Wallace, I shall be glad to answer your Lewiston address at its close tonight, before the same audience if possible."—Spokane Review.

Dr. Ed. E. Maxey was in the city yesterday in consultation with Dr. Young regarding the sickness of Mrs. Ralph Oakes, who has been confined to her home with a severe attack of pneumonia. An operation was performed which greatly relieved the patient by removing a quantity of serum from the plural cavity. Mrs. Oakes is now much improved.

A large and representative meeting of the stockholders of the Canyon County Fair Association was

held at the Commercial club rooms Monday evening. President H. D. Andrews called the meeting to order. Secretary J. B. Gowen called the roll. He then read a resolution introduced by Mr. H. W. Dorman and seconded by Mr. T. K. Little, authorizing the Board of Directors to sell the present fair grounds for \$15,000.00 or more, and to buy new grounds elsewhere. Mr. Dorman explained that the fair association was compelled to do something in order to clear up the indebtedness and prepare for the coming fair. Discussion by Messrs. Gowen, Dorman, Miller, Cupp, Redway, Doan, Aven, Merritt and Oakes. Mr. Doan was the only one opposed to changing the location. The vote was decisively in favor of the resolution, which was as follows:

Resolved by the stockholders of Canyon County Fair Association in special meeting assembled, duly and regularly called for this purpose, that the board of Directors of said association be and the same are authorized, empowered and directed to sell the real estate and property now belonging to said association at the highest price obtainable but not less than \$15,000 and out of the proceeds of said sale to repurchase real estate suitable for grounds for the purpose of continuing and holding a fair.
