Be it Resolved by the Mayor and Council of the City of Caldwell at a regular session, to canvass board this 21st day of February, 1910,

That we have canvassed the returns of the special bond election held in the City of Caldwell on the 21st day of February, 1910, and find the following result, which the city clerk is hereby directed to spread upon the minutes, to wit:

That said election was conducted according to law.

That at said election the question submitted was for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not the City of Caldwell shall issue municipal coupon bonds in the sum of \$50,000.00 for the purpose of defraying the expense of extending and improving the water works system in the City of Caldwell, the ballots reading: "In favor of issuing bonds to the amount of \$50,000 for the purpose stated in Ordinance No. 150, bonds yes," were submitted and a total of 301 votes were cast by electors who are taxpayers, and ballots reading "Against issuing bonds to the amount of \$50,000 for the purpose stated in Ordinance No. 150, bonds no," were submitted and a total of 74 votes were cast by electors who are taxpayers.

That a majority of over two-thirds of the qualified electors who are taxpayers of the city of Caldwell voted at said election and consented to the issue of said bonds and the incurring of said indebtedness.

We, therefore, declare the election duly carried by a two-thirds majority, according to law.

The roll being called on the passage of the resolution, the vote resulted: Ayes—Clark, Farrar, Gartin, Paynter—4. Nays—0. Absent—Devers, Harris—2. So the resolution passed.

ODDS AND ENDS.

To Prolong the Life of a Table Cloth—As soon as they show signs of wear cut four inches off one side and one end and hem them end and side. This brings a new part into the edges of the table where the cloth usually wears out.

Keeping Old Potatoes White—In the spring when cooking old potatoes put a tablespoonful or two of sweet milk in the water in which they are boiled and the potatoes will not turn that unappetizing dark color.

The Useful Cork—A very convenient thing for a housekeeper is a fancy bag made of cretone or silk-laine filled with corks of all sizes. The bag can be hung on the kitchen or pantry wall, and it will be especially useful in preserving time.

Melted paraffine in which the tops of bottles are dipped seals them and is much easier to remove than sealing wax.

A ring made of a large cork and fitted on the metallic knot on the corner of the teakettle will prove a convenience by saving burnt fingers. The ring may be made by burning out the center of the cork with a red hot iron.

Twine Ball Holder—The ordinary tin funnel makes a handy device for a new ball (or one made of odds and ends of twine) by placing the twine in the funnel and drawing it through the end. By hanging on a convenient nail in the kitchen it can also be used for culinary purposes when needed.

To Fold a Comforter—Nearly everyone keeps additional bedding on the foot of the bed in case of needing it on a cold night. A very convenient way to arrange this is to fold the comforter or blanket back and forth like a fan and if cold just take hold of the top edge and t draws up evenly and without any trouble.
