Arrow Rock Beats World.
"The largest, most thoroughly equipped and best organized construction camp in the world—a camp where 500 men are engaged in the building of the biggest dam known to modern engineering. Such is Arrow Rock—the practical result of conservation."

Thus does F. H. Newell, director of the reclamation service, the man who is a head of the work and its many projects throughout the United States, epitomize the Arrow Rock dam and reservoir after a week's visit at the works.

"I find the camp well organized, exceedingly well, in fact," continued Mr. Newell, "and the work is progressing in a manner that is gratifying to all connected with it. Every detail that would tend to increase the convenience of the men in the completion of the dam as well as every possible feature which would shorten the time of construction without impairing the excellence and fitness of the structure has been considered in the organization of the

camp. It is true that a great portion of the time since the beginning of operations last spring has been spent in preliminary work and as a result the camp is now prepared to proceed with the actual construction operations with little delay and under conditions which will assist rather than retard as the work continues.

A Superior Class of Men.
"We have been fortunate in securing plenty of laborers and I am free to say that the engineer in charge has employed a superior class of men with which to accomplish the work. I am especially pleased with the arrangement in this department."

"An electric light system has just been installed and the new large mess house has been completed but recently. These two additions to the working facilities complete the camp ready for steady work. It is expected that the railroad to the dam will be completed in November."

Mr. Newell came to Boise to review the work at the dam and to meet with the supervising engineers of the number of projects of the west. At this meeting several conclusions and resolutions regarding the reclamation work in the west were drawn up and submitted to Secretary Fisher at the time of his visit here last Saturday.

Arrow Rock to Beat the World.
Coincidences of interest in connection with the meeting of these engineers in Boise at this time are that H. N. Savage, one of the engineers, has just completed what is at present the biggest dam in the world. This structure is known as the Shoshone dam, in Wyoming, is constructed of concrete and is 328 1/2 feet high. The Arrow Rock dam, which is being built largely under the direction of F. E. Weymouth, supervising engineer of the Payette-Boise project, will wrest the honors from the Shoshone dam for the structure will be 350 feet in height. R. F. Walter, engineer from Colorado, who also attended the meeting, has only recently completed the construction of the largest earth dam in the world. This is the Belle Fourche dam in South Dakota, which is 115 feet high and built entirely of earth. Mr. Walter also supervised the construction of the largest irrigation tunnel in the world, a tunnel which worms its way for six miles through the mountains at Montrose, Colorado.

Miss Nellie Munroe of Butte, Montana, was the guest of Mrs. Effie Johnson, the week past.


