Court House News.



It is pretty generally known in Caldwell that Hon. C. W. Cooper is a banker and Socrates, but it is not generally known that his fame had spread to California. It has though. Mr. Cooper recently visited southern California, as the representative of the Caldwell Socialists. He also visited Venice as the following clipping from the Venice Daily Vanguard will show. The Vanguard says:
 Calista W. Cooper, known as the Socrates of Canyon county, Idaho, called yesterday on Police Sergeant Cavanaugh, who, in his stone mason days, built the court house at Caldwell, Idaho. Mr. Cooper came to southern California with a carload of horses and is taking time to see something of this part of the state and renew acquaintance with former residents of Canyon county who now live here. For 27 years he has engaged successfully in banking and the lumber business at Caldwell. These business occupations have not in the least affected his ardor as a reformer in politics. He was once a candidate for United States senator from Idaho on the populist ticket. In adopting woman suffrage Mr. Cooper says California will make no mistake, as it has proven an entire success in Idaho, he declares. He won his nickname of Socrates for his faculty of terse expression and ability in reducing perplexing political problems to simple equations.

Death of J. N. Tucker.

The many friends of J. N. Tucker were grieved to learn of his death Friday, September 29th, at the home of his son, John A. Tucker. Death resulted from pneumonia, which had developed in a few days from a bad cold. The funeral was held from the home Sunday, the Rev. Boone officiating. The funeral cortege was accompanied through the streets by the Knights of Pythias lodge in a body. Interment was had in the Lower Boise cemetery.

Mr. Tucker was one of the early pioneers of Idaho coming to the Boise valley in 1862. He was born in Illinois, February 5, 1833, moved to California in 1850, and in 1862 coming to Boise, and in 1866 moved to what is now known as the Tucker home. Mr. Tucker was one of the prominent men of the valley, with a wide reputation for sterling honesty and public spiritedness. While visiting with friends he contracted a bad cold, which developed into pneumonia. He has been living for some time with his son, John A. Tucker of this city.

Death of Mrs. Manning.

Mrs. Maurice Manning died at Boise Sunday morning, where Mr. Manning and wife had gone preparatory to going to California in hopes the change of climate might prove of benefit. The exact cause of death seems to be unknown. The affliction was contracted shortly after the birth of her babe several months ago. Mrs. Manning was well known in Caldwell having grown to womanhood near this city. A husband, child and three sisters survive the deceased.
