

ELOPEMENT PREVENTED BY GIRL'S FATHER.

Love Laughs at Blacksmiths but Takes Notice When Sheriff Arrives. While Alfred M. Harris, a private soldier in the hospital corps service at the Boise barracks and his 16-year-old sweetheart, Henrietta Stuart, a high school girl, were speeding toward Caldwell Saturday evening to get a marriage license in Canyon county and be made man and wife before the girl's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles A. Stuart, would be able to prevent the match, the telephone line was hot between the two places and Mr. Stuart, through the aid of the local officials, had communicated with Canyon county officials and with the county clerk at Caldwell. When the eloping couple stepped from the Interurban car to hasten to the court house, they were taken into custody by the Canyon county sheriff and the girl returned to her father, who followed on the next car, while Harris was arrested on the charge of making a false affidavit, which case was dismissed this morning by Judge Bower, it having been learned that while he stated the girl was 18 years of age to the authorities of the adjoining county, he had not made an affidavit to that effect and consequently the case was dismissed. Mr. Stuart paid \$5 to the court for the expense put to by the county in the case.

Miss Stuart is an attractive young girl and seemed clearly to realize the mistake which she had made in attempting to run away. In the presence of Judge Bower, her father and a representative of the Capital News this morning, she made a pledge that she would not again attempt to get married without the consent of her parents, but would not consent to give up her soldier boy, with whom she seemed quite infatuated. The young girl thanked Judge Bower for his courteous attention and interest he took in her welfare and again gave her pledge that she would not attempt to marry without the consent of her parents.—Capital News.
