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#### NAMPA BANKERS ARE ARRESTED.

C. E. Lore, former cashier of the Bank of Nampa, was arrested at Los Angeles Thursday. The charges against him are making false reports to the state banking commissioner and falsifying the records of the bank. The State Bank of Nampa closed its doors Saturday, September 27, and since that time has been in the hands of a receiver.

J. A. Givens, vice-president and acting manager of the bank, and C. L. Robbins, a director, were arraigned before Justice Blunck of Nampa, Monday, and placed under \$10,000 and \$5,000 bonds respectively. At the preliminary hearing all unnecessary formalities were waived. Mr. Givens was at La Grande and came to Caldwell as soon as he learned that warrants had been sworn out for his arrest.

In the complaint against Messrs. Givens, Lore and Robbins, drawn on behalf of the state by County Attorney Henry W. C. Frazier appears as the prosecuting witness. Mr. Frazier is a member of the executive committee of the depositors' organization affected a short time after the failure of the bank.

The facts set forth are said to have been the result of investigations made by the state bank examiner after the institution had been closed by his order September 27. In the report of April 15 it is alleged that loans and discounts of \$375,717.36 were certified when the true condition showed \$37,833.79; no overdrafts were reported when there should have been \$388,577 in this item; in the item of amounts due from other banks

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#### BUILDING BOOM PROMISED THIS YEAR

A number of buildings, enlargements and improvements are promised for the year 1914. One of these is the new planing mill which will be erected by Mr. Wright. George Crookham, secretary and manager of the Snake River Valley Co., wholesale fruit and seed dealers, states that before fall his company will have warehouses along the Oregon Short Line tracks. The building of these warehouses is becoming a necessity.

Mr. Murray, who owns the building occupied by the Rowland-Carter blacksmith shop will build the building back to the alley. Messrs. Rowland and Carter have notified him that they need more room and he has promised the addition.
