## UNCLE SAM SELLS MATERIAL USED ON BOISE PROJECT

Approximately \$50,000 Realized From Disposal of Equipment to Alaska Road

During the past few months the United States reclamation service has disposed of approximately \$50,000 worth of construction material and supplies used in the building of Arrowrock dam, the proceeds of the sales being credited to the Boise project. There is still a quantity to be sold and several bargains are awaiting those who are looking for good material. For instance, there are two rock crushers, two locomotives, a few nice little cottages and "other articles too numerous to mention," as the auctioneers say. For prices apply to Walker E. Young, assistant engineer in charge since the departure of Mr. Paul, or R. E. Evans, at the office on Reclamation avenue.

**Lively Business.**  
Mr. Young and Mr. Evans did a land office business last week with two representatives of the Alaska government railway, F. H. Bailey, division superintendent; and W. A. DeFoe, superintendent of construction on Mr. Bailey's division. These gentlemen went all over the works with Mr. Evans and purchased a carload of material, besides a passenger coach, three flat cars, oil drivers, two donkey engines and a lot of Acksmith's supplies and equipment. The carload included all the hospital equipment, such as microscopes, X-ray machines, medicines, surgical supplies, etc., and 300 bed springs, all of which will come in handy on the railway construction work and for which the project received good prices. It is also likely that the Alaska railway will engage some cableway and derrick men whose capabilities have been demonstrated on the Boise project.

**Cleaning Up.**  
The Davidson Grocery company of Boise bought a carload of groceries and a quantity of drygoods, practically cleaning out the Boise project commissary.

Large quantities of pipe have been sold to junk dealers. Some of the pipe showed signs of hard usage and went as junk but a considerable portion was serviceable and brought a good price. Valves and fittings were detached and sold as extras.

Electric motors and other construction material was picked up by contractors in Salt Lake and Portland.

**Disposal of Building.**  
office building at Arrowrock dam and the dormitory across the way have been leased to Mrs. Marion Myers who, it is understood, will transform them into a hotel. Her lease dates from April 15.

There are a few plastered cottages for sale. Some of the old buildings were purchased by ranchers and new settlers who dismantled them and carted away the lumber.

**Project Profits.**  
One locomotive was transferred to the Yuma, Arizona, project, the Boise project being credited with its value. Every dollar received for the sale of supplies and material is placed to the credit of the Boise project and the amount realized will aggregate a considerable sum, much more than was expected.

The fishing at Arrowrock is reported to be excellent. As the reservoir rises, earth keeps sliding down into the water. There is a worm in every clod and the trout are feasting.


