COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Council Chamber, City of Caldwell, Idaho, June 12, 1916.

Council meet in regular session, pursuant to adjournment with Mayor Fred C. Boyes presiding, Councilman Ackley, Dement, Forbes, Harrington, Hayman and Sanberg present, S. Ben Dunlap, Clerk, when the following business was transacted.

Councilman Forbes submitted the report for the committee appointed to examine the bids received on a power sprinkler and flusher, stating that the committee had met Monday evening and thoroughly examined the different bids and claims of the persons bidding, and had found the bid of the Auto Machine Company, of Caldwell Idaho to be the best one submitted.

A motion was made by Councilman Ackley that the report of the committee be accepted and that the committee be discharged. The motion was duly seconded by Councilman Dement and carried.

Upon request the clerk again read the bid of the Auto Machine Company.

A motion was made by Forbes that the bid of the Auto Machine Company be accepted, said bid appearing to be the cheapest and best that the machine described therein be purchased pro- machine - roved to be satisfactory to the council. The motion was seconded by Councilman Harrington. A ye a and nay vote being called for, was taken, and resulted as follows:

Ayes—Ackley, Dement, Forbes, Harrington, Sanberg—5
Nays—Hayman—1
Absent—None.

A majority have voted in favor of the motion the Mayor declared the same carried.

Councilman Forbes suggested that the City take immediate steps to cut the weeds in the principal streets of the City. The matter was put in the hands of the street committee with power to act.

Councilman Ackley suggested that there were a number of residences in the sewer districts which were not connected with the sewer and that steps be immediately taken to enforce the laws in this respect.

The matter was referred to the City Attorney with a request that he take immediate steps to abate such nuisances.

Councilman Forbes stated that the bridge on Tenth street should be widened as, its present condition was a menace to the safety of the traveling public.

It was voted upon motion of Ackley that the City Engineer be instructed to submit estimates of the cost of widening this bridge.

It was suggested that the Engineer submit estimates on a permanent and also on a piling bridge.

The Mayor stated that it had been

suggested to him that the Council room on the ground floor of the City Hall be made into a rest room for the ladies and children and that the Council room and Court room be moved to the third floor. He stated that the Commercial club and Forward club were willing to provide the necessary furniture for the rest room.

It was voted upon motion of Forbes that the Mayor appoint a committee of two to meet with the clubs and ascertain their views in the matter.

The Mayor appointed Ackley and Hayman.

No further business appearing it was voted upon motion of Hayman that Council adjourn.
