She asks that the custody of their three children, Leonard, age 11 years; Verne, age 6 years, and Helen, age 5 years, be awarded to her. The parties were married at Cheyenne, Wyo., January 25, 1905.

Important Amendment to the Reclamation Extension Act

On July 26, 1916, the President approved an Act of Congress amending Section 14 of the Reclamation Extension Act, which is well known as the legislation which provides for extending the term of payments from ten years to twenty years on all U. S. Reclamation projects.

The printed circular herewith is self explanatory, the substance of it being that upon proper showing to the Secretary of the Interior, he may in his discretion permit acceptance of the Reclamation Extension Act to all those who for any reason neglected or declined to avail themselves of the privilege within the six months' period originally prescribed as the period during which acceptances would be received.

Under this newly amended law it is now possible for all purchasers of government water rights to take advantage of the 20-year term of payments and other benefits of the Reclamation Extension law which was approved August 13, 1914.


