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### HOMEDALE

The members of the library committee of the Owyhee Improvement Club met at the home of Mrs. F. E. Trotter, Friday afternoon, and formulated plans for the management of the library and reading table. A book case is being built and cards and a filing case have been ordered. As soon as the book case is ready and the cards are received the books now on hand will be at the service of the people, and more books will be added as finances permit. Books will be loaned for a period of two weeks and a fine of two cents per day charged when books are kept overtime. Wednesday and Saturday afternoon of each week someone will be at the room and books can be borrowed and returned at that time. Donations of books or money for the purchase of books will be gratefully received. Mrs. Trotter as chairman of the library committee will take charge of such donations. Three of the latest books have been ordered as follows: "When a Man's a Man" by Harold Bell Wright; "Just David," by Eleanor H. Potter, and "The Sunset Trail," by Rex Beach. A fee of three cents a day will be charged for the use of these until sufficient money is received to cover the cost of the books, when they will become a part of the regular library. The following magazines are coming direct to the reading table: The Youth's Companion, Ladies' Home Journal, The American Boy, The Review of Reviews, The Country Gentleman, Century, and St. Nicholas. The following rules were adopted for use of the magazines on the table. Everyone is invited to come and read the new magazine at the table and none of these are to be taken home to read until the magazine of a month later date is upon the table. All magazines taken home to read are to be returned to the table in one week. We ask for a co-operation of the people to enforce these rules in order that each may have an equal chance to use the magazines. Any donations of magazines will be gladly received. Saturday (September 23) will be tag day for the raising of funds for use in buying new books and paying the expenses of running the library and reading table. The girls of the community will be asked to sell tags which will be 10c each and no one will be asked to purchase the second tag. The ladies of the community will keep an exact account of the magazines received and on the table at all times. A new case of books of the Free Traveling Library has been ordered and will be here soon.
