PIONEER SETTLERS AUTHORIZE THE REFUND BONDS

Plan to Cement Phyllis Sidehill Rejected at Election Monday.

The election in the Pioneer Irrigation District Monday resulted in the refund bonds carrying while the bonds for the cementing of the Phyllis sidehill were defeated. The election authorizes the board of directors of the district to issue refunding bonds in the amount of \$189,200 to take up bonds which are due or will be due within the next few years. The cost of cementing the Phyllis sidehill was estimated at \$79,980.00.

The vote was extremely light. A total of 190 votes were cast. Only 25 votes were cast against the refunding bonds and 164 in favor of the bonds. On the ditch improvement proposal 111 votes were cast for the improvement and 79 against.

I am now in Klamath Falls assembling horses for U. S. purposes. Will hold inspection September 1st, will probably have at least one hundred head that will pass. We have furnished already 500 head this season U. S. mounts from this territory and about 3000 head to the allies and other local buyers.

Mr. Strahorn, well known to Caldwell people, is here promoting a R. R. from here to Bend with favorable prospects of success. When the Caldwell Horse & Mule Co. get time I think will build one from Caldwell to Frisco, as it is the coolest summer resort that I know of, besides the Idahoans could run over to Frisco occasionally and get a Frisco Punch that makes the world look brighter and millionaires out of paupers as well as paupers of millionaires. Ladies (the spice of life) are very sociable, plentiful and possess many virtues. Otherwise I would probably not remain here long.

The liquor in question was the cargo seized at Nampa last week by Chief Maloney of Nampa and was in the possession of J. N. McBride and Manuel Azevado of Jordan Valley.

J. N. McBride and Manuel Azevado had their preliminary hearing before Justice C. R. Hickey at Nampa, Monday. They were bound over to the district court under bonds of \$2000.00 each. The defendants are charged with bringing liquor into the state illegally. The liquor consisted of 20 cases and the defendants will plead that they had it in their possession legally as they were simply transporting it from the railroad to Jordan Valley, Oregon. The arrest was made by Chief Maloney of Nampa.
