State Game and Fish

A Visit from our Warden, Mr Iorns, and the Publishing of the Law

W. I. Iorns, State Game Warden spent a few days in our town this week on matters relative to the game in this section. Mr. Iorns is an agreeable person to meet, seems to understand his duties and appears to be a thorough sportsman. He has appointed as deputy game warden for Latah, L. A. Kerr, whose qualifications and abilities are unquestioned, and spent some time with him going over the country. The licenses for fishing and hunting will soon be here when those having permits can exchange them. As a matter of information we will print the laws relative to fish and game, a copy of which we have secured. It is impossible to print them in one issue, but we will give it in sections as space permits, two sections of which herewith follows: Those desiring can either save the paper or cut out the sections.

Mr. Iorns states that the law is giving general satisfaction, and is appreciated by those who understand its provisions; that it means now and will mean in the future, the preservation of game and fish in our state, which would otherwise have shortly become exterminated.

Sec. 1. The Government shall appoint a suitable person to serve as State Fish and Game Warden, whose duty it shall be to protect the fish and game of this State, and to enforce the laws relating thereto. The State Fish and Game Warden shall hold his office for a term of two years and until his successor is appointed and qualified. Before entering upon the duties of his office the State Fish and Game Warden shall execute a bond to the State of Idaho in the penal sum of \$1000, conditioned for the faithful performance of his duties, and his bond shall be approved by the Governor. The Governor shall have power at any time to remove the State Fish and Game Warden for misconduct or neglect of his duties, and the Governor shall be the exclusive judge of misconduct or neglect of duties and shall upon such removal appoint a successor.
