The increased demand for State lands for grazing purposes is most gratifying and wide-awake stockmen and ranchers in every county are applying for tracts that are most convenient and desirable. Vast quantities of land here tofore open to the public are being fenced and the receipts for rental will materiall swell the common school fund. The income from this source has increased at a surprising rate.

Many live stock owners are not aware that all school land is subject to lease at prices ranging from 12 1/2 to 25 cents per acre per annum. Duplicate records of lands of each county are kept by the County Treasurer and are open for public inspection thus making it possible for any interested person to learn the status of any piece without trouble or delay. The treasurers of the various counties, as well as the Secretary of the State Land Department, will be pleased to furnish full information upon application either by mail or in person.
