Another one of these heavy grafting schemes has been brought to our attention. A carload of buggies, called the Spalding, has been sent to this point for distribution and their salesmen will immediately scatter to dispose of the lot. The rank injustice of it, the wrong done to our merchants, the short sightedness of those who buy and the sorrow consequent upon the purchase, makes one sore.

Every year these cheap eastern houses palm off a stock upon our western country and by means of specious words, presumed advantages or a cheaper price secure sales. It is wrong, and every one who invests in such is doing wrong to himself, his merchants, his town and community.

You ask why? First, this trading with peddlers and mail order houses is wrong in principle. Say that sales amount to \$50, that \$50. is taken absolutely out of the country and you receive it back never again. Reverse it, say your merchant sells you \$50; he buys your produce, helps pay for your church aids the fund for roads, is a factor in lighting your burden of taxes, and if he gives but fifty cents (it is generally more) to each project

he has actually brought the price of your \$50. down to about \$40. Now, what say you, is it not wrong in principle?

Then again, how can you expect favors and courtesies from your merchants when you give them a cut like buying from an eastern jobbing outfit. Now if this custom secured cheaper or better or superior articles, it would not be so flagrantly wrong, although it is our contention that wrong in principle, it is wrong in every case; but these goods in almost every instance are inferior, are held at a higher cash value and will not stand to the promises made.

Now we ask as a personal favor in justice to yourself and the town and country that you will deal direct with your merchants; will give all peddling concerns the go by and refrain from patronizing the mail order houses, referring them to your regular merchants or asking for a \$25 donation for your community and hear the answer.

Also if it is any advantage we will try and persuade our merchants to start the peddling and mail order business.

What say you, will you refrain?
