MEANS MUCH TO KENDRICK

Kendrick Milling Company Interests

Transferred to Vollmer-Clearwater

Grain Co.

The Clearwater Grain company yesterday purchased the big milling plant of the Kendrick Milling company, located at Kendrick, the consideration being \$30,000. H. H. Ames, capitalist, of Hutchinson, Minn., was the principal stockholder in the company and he made the sale in order to devote his entire time to large business interests in the east. The mill, which has a capacity of 225 bbls. a day, was installed at Kendrick about two years ago and is one of the largest plants in the inland empire country. The mill building is equipped in such manner as to enable the capacity to be conveniently increased to 500 barrels daily. The present water flume provides 200 horse-power and the water right is one of great value.

When seen yesterday and questioned regarding the purchase, Mr. E. W. Eaves, of the grain company, said: "The milling plant has been purchased for the purpose of a better market for the wheat grown in the Clearwater country. It will enable us to mix the bluestem wheat, grown in the lower altitudes of the grain belt, with the varieties grown in the higher altitudes, providing a combination that makes the best known flour. At the same time the step will allow us to add an extensive business to the grain business by cleaning grain and grinding feed for the coast and local market, returning our flour to our warehouses for local distribution. As the business demands, it is the purpose to increase the capacity of the mill up to the full 500 barrels daily."

It has been known for some time that the grain company has been negotiating for the purchase of the big milling plant but no announcement was made public until last evening—Lewiston Tribune.

This sale we believe means much for the good of Kendrick. The plant is one of the best in the state of Idaho but it has not been run to its full capacity. The new company will run it to its fullest capacity, employ more men and make a number of additions to the plant which will add greatly to its efficiency. We predict a large shipment of flour and feed stuff from this point at once and much larger shipments as the months go by. Mr. Ames who was formerly the principal owner of the plant will now devote the rest of his time to his large interests in the east.

Our Game Law

Sec. 5. It shall be unlawful to kill or destroy or have in possession for any purpose, at any time of the year, any trout or black bass less than four inches in length, and the possession of any such fish shall be a misdemeanor.

It is unlawful for any person or persons to stretch a line or lines in or across any of the waters of this State and attach thereto hooks commonly known as "snag hooks." The intention being to prohibit what is known as "snag hook fishing."

Sec. 6. It shall be unlawful for the owner or owners of any sawmill, reducing works, smelters, refining or concentrating works, or any of the employes thereof, or any other person or persons, whomsoever, to deposit, throw, or in any way permit to pass into any natural stream or lake any saw dust, chemicals, or other substances that will or may tend to the destruction or driving away from such waters, any fish or kill any fish by the use of any poison or deleterious drug or by the use of any explosive substance, or to explode or cause to be exploded, any powder, Hercules powder, dynamite, nitroglycerine, lime gas or other explosive substance, for the purpose of catching, killing, or destroying any kind of fish. Provided, that if it shall become necessary for any person or persons to use any of said explosives for the purpose of internal improvement in any of the streams or lakes of this State, such person or persons before using such explosives must secure permission from the county Commissioners, or the State

fish and game warden or the deputy warden of the county in which such said explosives are to be used. Provided further, that nothing in this act contained, shall prevent the owner or owners of any quartz mill for reduction works in this state, now or hereafter to be located upon any natural stream or lake, from operating said quartz mill or reduction works where the said owner or owners thereof shall build or cause to be built a suitable dam to be used in connection with said quartz mill or reduction works, for preventing any deleterious chemicals from flowing into such stream or lake.

Council Proceedings

The City council met in regular meeting Wednesday evening June 3rd. All the members were present. The minutes of the preceding meeting were read and approved with slight corrections. The following bills were allowed and ordered paid; Kendrick Gazette \$5.75; Chas. Weber. \$46.25; H. P. Hull \$1.40; D. B. Mackintosh \$5. Crocker & Meyers \$5.15; Cora Crow \$10; D. J. Rowlands \$1.65; Hunter & VonSoehnen \$2.70; Henry Durbin, \$40; D. W. Hannah \$17.50; Five dollars and fifty cents were deducted from the bill of the Lincoln Hardware & Implement Co. for \$21.90 for replacing hydrant until such time as the hydrant should be properly fixed. The balance of the bills was allowed and ordered paid. The bill of D. W. Hannah for \$17.50 was not allowed. The report of the street and alley committee was read and adopted condemning certain sidewalks. The street commissioner was ordered to notify property holders having such sidewalk in front of their property to replace them at once in accordance with the recommendations of the committees on file in the office of city clerk. The report of the special committee on the bond of Joseph Frucht was read and adopted and the bond ordered to be cared for by the clerk. The petition of Joseph Frucht that he be allowed to remove dirt in or upon Kirby street under instructions of the street commissioner was reported favorably and the petition granted. The street commissioner was instructed to drain the water from the lower end of main street the cost not to exceed \$25. The finance committee was authorized to employ an attorney in drawing up the tax ordinance. The council then adjourned to meet at the call of the chairman.
