The situation was thoroughly canvassed and it was decided to finish the collection of what had been subscribed and see what further amount could be raised; Math Jacobs being added to the committee to assist in collecting.

The fine cold storage building of Lewis Hunter can be either purchased or rented thus giving unexcelled facilities for handling and storage. With a competent manager to attend to the business we feel confident the association can save enough margin over the previous years profits to open their eyes to the advantages of the association. It is to be hoped that every man who has a bearing fruit tree will attend this meeting and will do their best to make a strong organization. The small growers want to remember that this really means more to them than it does to the heavy orchardists, for the latter are in a measure independent of the commission house while the former are now and have been at the mercy of the local buyers.

At a meeting of the school board Monday evening the trustees considered the applications for positions as teacher in the school here the ensuing term and have tendered the position to Mrs. E. Clayton, Miss Clayton and Miss Strong. These teachers all came strongly recommended and have good records as teachers.
