## Stores Close After Six P. M.

The Clerks Secure an Agreement from Our Merchants to that Effect

Except on Saturday Evenings

A Good Move which should have been inaugurated long since but is better late than never Works hardship on None, but a Benefit to All

One of the most important movements in many ways that has been set on foot in recent months among our business men is that of six o'clock closing. The clerks and business men have been discussing the matter for several weeks and have at last come to an agreement to close the most of the business houses at the hour mentioned above after July 1st. There have been several attempts in the past to come to such an agreement but they have always failed through the refusal of some one to close at that hour. The paper which was circulated among our business men this week was signed by all the principal business men among them being, M. C. McGrew, D. J. Rowlands, H. P. Hull, Halzlip & Norman Lincoln Hardware and Imp. Co. A. P. Hamley Postmaster, McCrea Bros & Hunter Bros.

Those who have not signed it are such as carry cigars and notions, the icecream parlors and Lemonade stands. Kendrick is about the only town of any importance in the whole country where the old time barbarous practice of keeping open until late at night is still continued. It is a hardship on the clerks who work more hours under such a system than any other body of employees except barbers and it is a pity that the selfishness of the general public should keep these latter working as long as they do. From 7 o'clock in the morning to 6 in the evening is long enough for any man to work and when he is compelled to work longer the pressure will show itself in his general make-up sooner or later and will prevent him from being vigorous and energetic in his work as he otherwise would be if his working days were shorter and he was allowed some time for rest and recreation. It strikes us as being a first class business venture as well as being humanitarian in its practical workings. The closing of the stores at 6 o'clock will also offer the merchants themselves time for rest and recreation and for getting acquainted with their families. There are some men would prefer remaining in the store 24 hours if possible but these are few and far between.

The great majority do need and desire shorter hours and should have them. We rejoice then that on July 1, the business houses of Kendrick will close at 6 P. M. except on Saturday evening and continue thereafter as long as the agreement is kept.

The man who comes to these stores after 6 o'clock after July 1st and grows because he cannot get in ought to be taken out in the woods and well we dont know a punishment adequate to this offence. Circulars have been printed and scattered all over the country so that every one may know of the arrangement and no one may put in a plea of ignorance for appearing before the doors of any of our business houses and asking admittance.

### Fruit Growers Meeting

A small but enthusiastic meeting of fruit growers of this section was held in the Lewis Hunter cold storage building last Saturday. There was considerable discussion as to organizing an association and it was finally decided to organize with a stock capitalization of \$5000 with shares at \$10 apiece.

A committee consisting of H. A. Russell, Albert Lee and Henry Wessels was appointed to solicit subscriptions and it was decided to meet the following Saturday to perfect the organization. The most of the stock will be taken on American, Bar and Potlatch Ridges as the most of the fruit growers live on these ridges. Two propositions were submitted to the convention of either purchasing or renting the cold storage building of Mr. Hunter and the opinion seemed to be more favorable toward leasing if a suitable manager can be found. Negotiations are now in process with one and doubtless he will be secured. The general sentiments of the meeting seemed to be in favor of limiting the number of shares to be held by any one stockholder to 5 which will avoid any one getting control.

The organization of a fruit growers association is what the Gazette has been advocating for several years.

We believe the growers will realize more out of their crops in this way than in any other and we hope to see the scheme perfected in all of its details and the fruit of the Potlatch marketed through the association this year.

### Accident

A most distressing accident occurred here last Tuesday morning when Ollie the little eight-year girl of Ed. Lewis, fell over the cliffs just back of the school house. The little one was going down the precarious path which Mr. Lewis uses in going to and from the brickyard where he is employed.

At a point of rocks about fifty feet from the chute the little one tripped on a stone, fell over the cliff and rolled down to the bottom, a distance of nearly fifty feet. When Mr. Lewis picked her up she was unconscious. She was carried home and Drs. Hunter and Rothwell were summoned. They found that she had sustained a severe fracture of the frontal bone but no other bones were broken. With the assistance of Dr. Gritman of Moscow the skull was trephined in the afternoon and the little girl regained consciousness in a couple of days. It is still a question whether she will recover or not as she is hurt internally, her kidneys having been ruptured.

The road is now partially completed to within two or three hundred yards of the junction of the two creeks Big and Little Bear. There are a number of places where there is considerable rock work to do yet and this is necessarily slow when the rock is all hard basalt. It will take all the money that was raised last week to complete it and perhaps more. The business men of Kendrick have responded nobly to this enterprise but they now feel that they have done all they can do. Hereafter the expense of maintaining it will be given over to the users of the road many of whom have failed to keep their promises in regard to work subscribed.

We hope that they will yet see their mistake and get in and do some hard work. It means more to them than to any one else.

### The Water Company

The Kendrick Water Company is making the most strenuous efforts to supply more water for the town. Under the supervision of Mr. Evans the Co. has a force of men at work on the Potlatch side just above the new reservoir opening up new springs and making provisions for getting all the water that can be had from the old ones. The reservoir has been thoroughly cleaned and is being recalked to prevent leaking and the wooden pipes leading from the springs to the reservoir being replaced by new ones that will not leak. The company is going to considerable expense and trouble in all this and are making no stir about it either. They are planning also on putting up a reservoir for free purposes on the bench north of town some what below and to the right of the old one. The Company is making a thoroughly conscientious attempt to provide water to spare for all purposes and are hoping to succeed. We are sure that they will.
