used towards erecting a strong and
high breakwater between the creek
and the town at the upper end if
no where else. The creek bottom
at the lower end of town is deeper
and wider than at the upper end
and there would be little danger
from it. But the upper end should
be thoroughly protected.

The sad accident that befel little
Ollie Lewis last Tuesday has open-
ed our eyes to the dangerous situa-
tion of the school house, situated
as it is nearly on the edge of the
bluff over which she fell. It is not
so long since one of the school chil-
dren fell over this bluff but for un-
ately was not hurt. Yet others
may fall and be seriously injured
or crippled for life or perhaps
killed. There is a fence around
the school house grounds and this
is a slight protection but it is very
slight. If the city council would
stretch a tight wire fence across the
head of B street running east and
8th street running north, both of
which end abruptly on the edge of
these bluffs, it might save life or
injury to some one in the future.
We suggest that they look into it
and do all they can to insure the
greater safety of the school chil-
dren, many of whom have been in
the habit of playing dangerously
near the precipice. Children will
forget and sometime in the earnest-
ness of their play they approach
nearer danger than they otherwise
would.

The Vollmer Clearwater Grain Co.
have taken charge of the plant recently
purchased by them of the Kendrick
Milling Co. and are getting ready to
do business on an extended scale. As
soon as some preliminaries are arrang-
ed with the railroad they will erect
another large warehouse between the
mill and the railroad for the storage of
grain, flour and mill stuff in general.
This will add considerable space to
their storage room and make it much
more convenient for shipping and re-
ceiving. They have erected a tower
just beyond the driveway on the south
side of their warehouse in the upper
part of town for the support of the bul-
last carriage of the tramway. This
will add to the safety of the plant
at this point for as it was the ballast
carriage overhanging the driveway and
was a source of uneasiness to the teams
as they drove under it though it might
never have fallen. As it is now the
company has made it perfectly safe.

Shall We Have One Too?

The 10 ton street roller purchased by
the county for the improvements of
the roads near Moscow has arrived and
will be put to work immediately. The
Moscow Business Mens association
pledge \$1500 on condition the county
would buy the roller and will have
charge of the work. This reminds us
that the present board of commissioners

roller whenever our roads are put in
such shape that we can use one.
