LAND WITHDRAWN FROM ENTRY.

Franklin, Adams and Walla Walla Counties.

One million one hundred and sixteen thousand acres of land, comprising nearly all of Franklin county and portions of Adams and Walla Walla counties were ordered withdrawn from desert land entry by the department of the interior.

This immense order, received at the Walla Walla land office by telegraph, comprises 50 townships. Franklin county is taken intact, excepting 4000 acres along the Snake river. The part of Walla Walla county comprises the portions next to the Snake of the following townships: 9-31, 9-32, 10-33, 10-32, 11-33, 12-34, 13-34, 13-35, 13-36.

Following are included in Adams county: 16-28, 16-29, 16-30, 16-31, 16-32, 15-28, 15-29, 15-30, 15-31, 15-32. This is the southwestern portion of the county.

In Whitman county only a few acres are taken and in Yakima the southwest corners of townships 9-29 and 13-28. Homestead entry is still possible within this area, but desert entries, of which there have lately been many in Franklin county, are cut off.

BIG FIRE AT NOME.

Lawrence Hotel Gone Up in Smoke—Loss \$25,000.

Seattle, July 1.—The steamer Senator has arrived in port from Nome, the third vessel out from Bering sea. The Senator brought \$40,000 in gold from the Nome country and several passengers. She arrived at her northern destination June 16, after battling with the ice for more than two weeks. It was so thick in Bering sea on the way southward that the vessel was delayed fully a day by the floes.

The Lawrence hotel at Nome, one of the largest hotels in the town, was destroyed by fire just previous to the departure of the Senator, entailing a loss of fully \$25,000. The day previous to the hotel blaze fire was discovered in the big store of the North American Transportation & Trading company, but was extinguished before much damage was done.

Several other Nome vessels are expected to arrive in port within the next day or two. The Portland, the first of the larger vessels to sail at the beginning of the season, had reached Nome and was discharging at the time of the Senator's departure.

LATE TELEGRAPH BRIEVITIES

CULLED FROM DISPATCHES OF THE ASSOCIATED PRESS.

A Review of Happenings in Both Eastern and Western Hemispheres During the Past Week—National, Historical, Political, and Personal Events Tensely Told.

Sir Thomas Lipton, the challenger for the America's cup, lunched with President Roosevelt at the White House recently.

Clarence English of Nebraska City, Neb., and "Battling" Nelson of Chicago fought 15 rounds to a draw in Kansas City, Mo., recently.

Nick Burley of Seattle knocked out Joe Choynski in the second round recently at Dawson. Choynski announces this evening that he will never fight again.

Great Northern officials predict as a result of the great wheat crop all former traffic records will be broken in the northwest next year. Conditions are good everywhere. Range men praise the cattle industry.

Frederick James Bailey, naval storekeeper at Esquimalt, near Victoria, B. C., was murdered recently at the naval yard by Alfred J. H. Frith, a subordinate, who shot and killed him. Frith has been arrested and has confessed.

Two men are dead and five are seriously injured as a result of a head-on collision that occurred in the yards of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway in Des Moines, Iowa, between an accommodation train and a freight train drawn by two engines.

At Santa Cruz, Cal., recently an explosion occurred in the department of the Black powder works, causing the roof to be blown up. The machinery and walls were left intact. About 1500 pounds of powder exploded. Fortunately the employees were at lunch.

Hill's hand in the Erie management is shown by the record of earnings beating all other anthracite roads. The May net increase is over \$600,000 and the 11 months' net increase is \$2,000,000 greater than the previous years, although there was a six months' strike during the present year.

The supreme court of Tennessee has held the Adams law, passed at the last session of the legislature, to be constitutional. The law is a temperance measure and provides for the abolition of saloons in all towns having a population of 5000 or under upon a submission of the question to popular vote. There are only eight towns in that state that are exempt from its operation.

President Roosevelt's homecoming for the summer was made the occasion of a fete at Oyster Bay, L. I. His reception was notable for its enthusiastic cordiality and likewise for its vigor. The latter quality was due to the slight fractional difference among the townspeople, the result being that the president was accorded a double reception.

Great interest is shown in the report by the British consul general at Canton of a heavy demand for American flour among emigrants returning from the United States to China, mostly received via the Pacific coast. Last year the record was 95,000,000 pounds ahead of the previous year.

J. B. Horan, a new brakeman on the high line at the Morrissey colliery, B. C., met with a fatal accident recently. He attempted to jump from the donkey engine while it was in motion and, missing his footing, fell in front of the wheels. The engine passed over him, cutting off one leg and breaking the other.

New York real estate assessments this year amount to \$4,730,000,000, an increase of \$1,400,000,000 over last year. The personal assessment is \$678,000,000, an increase of \$153,000,000. The total increase in assessment values is \$1,553,000,000. The estimated tax rate this year is \$1.40, against \$2.27 last year.

The Tracy Reward.

Davenport, Wash., July 2.—At the conclusion of testimony in the Tracy reward case Judge Neal took the case from the jury and instructed it to bring a verdict in favor of plaintiffs, who are the Creston posse. No arguments were made to the jury. All of the defendants except Goldfinch had previously withdrawn their claims. The reward is \$2500. The Oregon reward, which was received by the Creston men, was \$1500. Goldfinch will take an appeal. The jurors are indignant at being compelled to sign a verdict which they did not reach.

Rainstorm in New York.

New York, July 1.—New York and vicinity, as well as other parts of the country, were flooded by a downpour of rain, during which, in the course of a few hours, about half as much water fell as in the prolonged period of wet weather this month. The storm was accompanied by thunder and lightning and several conspicuous spots were struck by bolts.

WASHINGTON NEWS.

The Columbia river is falling fast. The actual increase in buildings in Spokane in the past 13 months was 21.57 per cent.

John S. Carter, pioneer and one of the best known citizens of Whitman county is dead.

The striking millworkers of Spokane announce that their cooperative mill will be started next week.

Mrs. Mary Brown of Everett was elected president of the State Federation of Womens' clubs at Everett last week.

The cool weather of the past week has been of considerable help to growing wheat. The outlook now is for a fair crop.

The new railroad to connect Spokane with the Canadian Pacific is an assured fact. It is thought the road will be completed by next year.

A picnic and stock show will be held near Pullman July 8, 9 and 10 by the seventh annual reunion of the Whitman County Veterans' association.

The Everett Record says it is believed that the Northern Pacific is contemplating the extension of the Monte Cristo road to Coulee City, Douglas county.

The homeseeker rates will remain in effect every Tuesday out of St. Paul until the third Tuesday in October. These rates are one fare plus \$2 for the round trip.

While it is impossible to predict with any degree of certainty what the run of salmon will be, all conditions are favorable for a good run on Puget sound this season.

Becker of Ogden has the honor of having the highest average of the three days' shoot, having lost only 45 birds out of 600. Sheard lost 56, W. H. Seaver 61, E. E. Ellis 62.

At Seattle a wall of clay 20 feet high caved in on three laborers recently, instantly killing A. Jampere and resulting in injuries to Samuel Romeo and R. C. Vanderhoof.

Eastern Washington apples on sale at a hotel in Vienna for \$1.25 each were seen by R. E. Strahorn and wife of Spokane, who have just returned from an extended European tour.

It has been decided not to have any poultry exhibit at the interstate fair at Spokane this fall. A poultry show will probably be given by poultry fanciers some time during the winter.

The annual session of the Whitman County Veterans' association, which meets in Pullman for an encampment of three days, beginning July 8, promises to be one of the big affairs of the summer.

At the Sportsmen's Association of the Northwest at Dayton last week officers were elected for the years 1903-04 and the state of California was admitted into the association. The officers elected were as follows:

P. F. Smith, Tacoma, president; M. B. Brownlee, Spokane, first vice president; J. Hillis, Libby, Mont., second vice president; A. P. Biglow, Ogden, Utah, third vice president; E. V. Ceasar, Tacoma, secretary and treasurer. Members of the board were elected as follows: T. B. Ware, Spokane; Mr. Abraham, Portland; Mr. Sheard, Tacoma; Mr. Baker, Dayton; Mr. Woods, Tacoma.

A case of attempted murder occurred recently at Curlew lake, on the Colville reservation. A settler, whose name the victim refuses to disclose, rode on horseback to the shack of Daniel McLennan, a fellow homesteader, and without a moment's warning pulled a gun and began shooting. The first bullet struck McLennan in the abdomen, passing out at the back, missing the vital organs. He will recover.

The first salmon for the pack of 1903 by the Pacific Packing & Navigation company were taken from the nets of the company last week and packed at Fairhaven. The catch consisted of some 700 fish, and 300 cases of the finished product were put up.

While Charles A. Cushing, president of the Port Angeles & Eastern railroad, was cleaning his shotgun recently he in some manner accidentally discharged one barrel of the gun into his abdomen. The gun was loaded with birdshot, the full charge of which entered the body on the left side. Although Mr. Cushing was not killed his condition is very critical.

George Goude, a machinist of Oakesdale, is at work upon a combined header and thresher that may revolutionize threshing methods in the Palouse country. The machine is the invention of L. B. Mack and W. F. York of Walla Walla and Mr. Goude and is designed with a view to overcome the defects of the present combined machines on the Palouse hills.

Fought a Draw.

San Francisco, July 2.—The Hanlon-Yanger go at the Mechanics' pavilion ended in a draw at the end of the 20th round, Referee Eddie Smith being unable to choose a winner between the game little featherweights. The fight was one of the fiercest ever seen in this city.

Russia's Grain Crop.

St. Petersburg, July 2.—An official forecast of the winter grain crop shows them to be generally satisfactory throughout the empire.
