Sir:— I take pleasure in informing you that in accordance with your request Rural Free Delivery service has this day been ordered established from Kendrick, Latah county, Idaho, with one carrier to commence on Tuesday September 15, 1903.

This route is known as the American ridge and is thus defined.

By way of north grade, first to Ball's and Brillharts, thence to J. Davidson's and there to F. Roberts. Retracing to Davidson's thence north to F. May's and return to U. G. Evans; thence to S. Bigham's, back to Chas. Jessup's; thence south to Martin Thomas' and return to Kendrick via John Hutchinson.

Those who took the examination were J. I. Mitcham and Wm. Whetstone, but we have not heard which one received the position of carrier.

Business Men's Meeting

Monday evening a meeting of the Business Men was called to consider the report of the road committee in regard to the Bear creek road and also to as much as possible close the matter up. The meeting was called to order by President D. S. McCrea and report called for. L. A. Kerr asked for a few days more time ere the committee submitted an itemized statement but gave the approximate figures as follows:

Money raised by Kendrick \$408.00
Given by County \$800.00
Bal due and unpaid 935.00
Total cost of road \$2143.95

According to agreement between the Board and town this balance is to be equally borne by the above parties, so we now have an obligation of \$467. to meet. Subscriptions unpaid and cash resources it was considered would reduce this amount to \$350

It was the sense of those present that the farmers who had subscribed work and had not paid their subscriptions either all or in part be asked to donate in cash the balance and those benefited and not down for any amount be asked to help reduce this amount.

On motion the road committee was requested to attend to the matter as a above stated and also to arrange for the payment of interest on time checks now outstanding.

The subject of a cannery was next discussed and a committee, on motion, appointed by the chair to attend to the matter. G. W. Suppiger, A. W. Gordon and T. A. Hunter is the committee

On motion the sentiment of the organization and of the town was shown to Martin Thomas by a hearty and unanimous vote of thanks for work which money could not pay and efficient management which is seldom secured.

After this pleasing duty the body adjourned, subject to the call of the president, D. S. McCrea.

Tuesday was a bad day for chicken houses in Kendrick, two having burned that day with some poultry. The one belonged to Will Long at the upper end of town and the other to Mr. Reeves on the John Crews place just above town. It seems that the ladies under took to fumigate the buildings by burning sulphur in them. In some way both buildings took fire and burned to the ground the loss however in either case not being very great. When Mr. Long's building burned an alarm of fire was turned and our citizens and fire brigade turned out promptly to put out the fire. It might have resulted seriously as it stood near other buildings which if they had taken fire would have resulted in much loss. This makes our usual three fires in succession and we trust we will now have a season of rest.
