Council Meeting.

The city council met in regular
 monthly session Wednesday evening,
 September 2, all the members being
 present. The minutes of the previous
 meeting were read and approved. The
 following bills were allowed: Lincoln
 Hardware Co., \$21.50; Crocker &
 Meyer, \$3; Charles Weber, \$18.12; T. B.
 West, \$21.50; T. B. West, \$5; J. I.
 Mitcham, \$28.60; Dr. Hunter, \$4; Miss
 Cora Crow, \$5; D. B. Mackintosh, \$5.
 The petition of John Sandberg and
 others for a crosswalk on Kirby street
 was granted. The petition of E. L.
 Clem in regard to the fencing of a cer-
 tain spring in the extreme north part
 of town, was heard and granted. The
 petition of several citizens for a night
 watchman was referred to the police
 committee, who asked for further time.
 Ordinance No. 86, for the repeal of the
 ordinance on dog tax, was read for the
 first time. The fire, police and health
 committee was instructed to investi-
 gate the proposition of buying the
 waterworks. The street and alley
 committee were instructed to investi-
 gate the matter of a certain piece of
 land that belongs to the city and is
 now fenced by private parties.
 The council then adjourned until
 the next regular meeting.

By Dear Sir:
 I have received many requests from
 Modern Woodmen of America of var-
 ious camps, asking whether my son's
 (J. B. Trull) insurance claim was re-
 jected and I take this method of an-
 swering all who are interested in said
 claim. The following are the facts so
 far as I understand them:

J. B. Trull was taken sick some time
 in the last of April '08 and lived until
 the 5th of May 1908. Dr. Taylor of
 Nez Perce attended him until death.
 It was thought by some he had small-
 pox but Dr. Taylor said it was not
 smallpox but some other disease. In
 making out the proof of the immediate
 cause of his death, Dr. Taylor as the
 attending physician, was called on
 for a sworn statement as is required in
 in such cases by the order. Dr. Taylor
 gave the required certificate and swore
 that his immediate death was caused
 by erythema. The report went to
 the head camp as is required by said
 organization. Some person made it
 their business to write a very confiden-
 tial letter to the head camp, stating
 that J. B. Trull died of smallpox be-
 yond a doubt and the head camp
 seemed to believe this confidential let-
 ter more than they did the report of
 the local camp at Greer, Ida, of which
 my son was an official member. They
 held up the claim until they could
 send out an investigating committee
 to see this confidential correspondent
 and gather further statements from
 other parties as to the cause of J. B.
 Trull's death. The parties giving
 these statements knew just about as
 much about smallpox as I do and I
 know nothing about it. To further
 show that they did not act in good
 faith with J. B. Trull in their official
 paper sent by his local camp, the cause
 of his death was ignored and the er-
 roneously published the statement that
 he died of smallpox. This shows very
 plainly that they did not care to pub-
 lish the facts in their official paper
 relative to the death of a brother
 Woodman. They also stated that Mr.
 Trull made a waiver in his applica-
 tion for his insurance, and therefore
 are not liable for his insurance in case
 he died with smallpox. But the fact
 remains that he did not die of small-
 pox according to the death proof, yet
 they published it in their official paper
 that he did die of that disease. Now
 does any one believe that such actions
 as these are fair or brotherly, or even
 gentlemanly, to publish such a state-
 ment on a dead brother and then act
 on the publication as though it was
 true in order to avoid the payment of
 his claim? After they raised the ques-
 tion of smallpox it would be necessary
 or them to establish the fact that Mr.
 Trull was not vaccinated before he
 joined the Woodmen and before he
 died in order to claim the benefit of
 the waiver, even if they are entitled
 to such benefit, which I doubt. The
 parties giving these statements know
 just about as much as I do about
 smallpox. This confidential correspon-
 dent is a member of the same or-
 ganization that my son was, so it is
 evident that they have traitors in
 their camp who tried to stab a brother
 after he was in his coffin, though the
 head camp exposed him by showing
 his letter. This looks like a fine kettle
 of fish. J. B. Trull paid all his dues
 and was square on the books for I have
 his receipts. But his claim was re-
 jected. They did not seem to pay any
 attention to anything but outside
 statements, and they spent as much
 money to avoid paying a dead brother's
 claim as the claim would amount
 to. Such is the history and result of
 J. B. Trull's efforts to lay up some-
 thing for his old father in his old age
 in case the father outlived the son.
 The organization got his money and
 he gets a stab in his coffin from a
 brother member and the head camp
 approves of the stab by taking the
 statement of the person who made the
 stab and acting accordingly instead of
 being governed by the official report
 of the local camp, of which J. B. Trull
 was a member.

I have been advised to collect the
 same through the courts of the
 country. If I do so I hope every M.
 W. A. in the west will be present to
 hear the suit tried except the traitor
 who tried to stab my son after he was
 dead.
