WHAT'S TO BE DONE

In conversation with Prof. Barackman as to school matters and progress, we learn that it is progressing as fine as can be wished for under the circumstances the only draw back being the crowded condition. The teachers are doing excellent work and having had no interruption this year by sickness or stoppage from other causes the work has been productive of good results.

There are now enrolled over 200 pupils and the rooms are in a congested condition; Miss Hunter has 75 in her room, the primary, Miss Morris, 20 in the lower school, Miss Fisher is teaching 54 intermediate and Professor 48. It seems to us that the school board should attend to this matter and in some means relieve the pressure, as at least two of the teachers have too great a task to perform with credit and efficiency, the maximum number that one teacher should have in charge being placed at 40.
