THE PANAMA REPUBLIC.
How the U. S. Gets in on the Ground
Floor per the Roosevelt Policy.
Secretary Hay has signed a canal
treaty with M. Varilla, the minister
of Panama, by which the United
States acquires absolute sovereignty
over a strip of territory five miles wide
on each side of the canal, the right to
enforce sanitary regulation and public
peace in the cities of Panama and Colon
possession of four islands in the vicinity
of the isthmus, and the monopoly
of any system of communication be-
tween the oceans either by canal or rail-
road. In return our government
guarantees the independence of the
Republic of Panama, pays that coun-
try \$10,000,000 and begins nine years
from date of treaty, an annual rental
of \$250,000. The Panama commis-
sioners arrived in Washington several hours
after the Hay-Bunau-Varilla treaty
was signed by the new minister. They
expressed great satisfaction at the
terms of the treaty, and one of them
will carry the document to Panama
for ratification. It is thought that the
assent of Panama will be obtained
about Dec. 10, and the treaty will then
be sent to the senate, where it is sure
to be ratified. The republicans need two
democratic votes in order to get a two-
thirds majority to approve a treaty,
but in this case most of the democrats
will support the Administration. The
position of the minority senators was
expressed by Senator Bacon of
Georgia, who said that although they
opposed the haste and disregard for in-
ternational law, displayed by the
president in recognizing Panama, they
would not allow themselves to be put
on record as opponents of a treaty
which hastened the construction of a
canal. The canal is much desired in
the southern states and this accounts
for the attitude of many southern
senators who would otherwise gladly
oppose the administration. The Pan-
ama government is about to be recog-
nized by the European powers although
they declare that the new republic
should assume an equitable portion
of Colombia's debt, which amounts to
about \$15,000,000. Probably our gov-
ernment will pay an indemnity to Col-
ombia for the loss of the isthmus.
With the ratification of the new
treaty Panama will become practically
a part of the possessions of the United
States. The right to police the cities
and to dictate sanitary laws gives us
virtual control of Colon and Panama,
and we shall doubtless make use of our
right to fortify the canal.
Panama, Dec. 2.—The canal treaty
was signed at 11:30 a. m. today. There
were no amendments to the treaty.

Ordinance No. 83.
Enacted an ordinance to prohibit certain
animals from running at large within the
corporate limits of the village of Kendrick,
state of Idaho.
Be it ordained by the chairman and board
of trustees of the village of Kendrick:
Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any per-
son, owner or custodian of any cattle, sheep,
horses, mules, hogs or any other live stock,
to permit the same to run at large within the
incorporated limits of the village of Kendrick,
state of Idaho, between the 15th day of Aug.
and the 15th day of November of each year,
and at all other times between the hours of
6 o'clock p. m. and 6 o'clock a. m.
Section 2. It shall be the duty of the street
commissioner, watchman or other employe
of the village of Kendrick to cause any cattle,
horses, mules, sheep, hogs or any other live
stock running at large to cause the same to be
taken up and impounded in the village pound.
Section 3. It shall be the duty of the street
commissioner, watchman or other employe of
the village of Kendrick, Idaho, within 24
hours after impounding any stock, to cause
three notices to be posted in three of the most
public places within the village limits which
notices shall state that there is impounded in
the village pound such horses, mules, sheep,
hogs or any other live stock as the case may
be by giving, as near as possible, an accurate
description of animals, by giving the color,
weight, marks, brands, the date when im-
pounded and the date of sale.
Section 4. It shall be the duty of the street
commissioner, watchman, or other employe
of the village of Kendrick after impounding
any stock to cause the same to be sold at pub-
lic auction to the highest bidder for cash with-
in 4 days from the posting of said notices, and
the proceeds of such sale is to be deposited
in the city treasury, after paying all necessary
costs, such as taking up, feeding and sale of
said animals.
Section 5. It shall be the further duty of
the street commissioner, watchman or other
employe of the village of Kendrick, impound-
ing any stock to charge 30 cents per head for
cattle, horses, mules, sheep, hogs or any live
stock for the taking up and impounding said
stock, and 10 cents per head for the feeding of
each animal per day.
Section 6. The owner of any cattle, horses,
mules, sheep, hogs or other live stock so im-
pounded is hereby permitted to redeem said
stock at any time before said animal is sold
by paying all necessary expenses such as im-
pounding and feeding of said stock.
Section 7. It shall be the further duty of
the street commissioner, watchman or other
employe of the village of Kendrick to give
the purchaser of any animal a certificate
showing that such animal was sold pursuant
to this ordinance.
Section 8. All ordinances or parts of ordi-
nances now in conflict with this ordinance
are hereby repealed.
Section 9. This ordinance shall be in force
and effect from and after its passage, approv-
al and publication.
