**OREGON NOTES.**  
Wood is still selling at \$7 per cord by the Pendleton dealers.  
There is general satisfaction in Eastern Oregon because the legislature appropriated \$100,000 to purchase a right of way for the Celilo canal.  
The annual meeting of the Oregon and Washington division of the Travelers' Protective association took place in Portland recently, with about 200 members in attendance. C. W. Ransom was elected president.  
It has been demonstrated at La Grande this year, as it has been at Waverly, that it pays to raise sugar beets. The Oregon factory has had a good season, and the farmers who have supplied it with raw material have realized handsome profits.  
Five cases of highway robbery, a part of them in the business center of Portland, recently took place one afternoon and one night, and the police think they were all perpetrated by the same two men. Three of the victims were relieved of amounts ranging from a few dollars to \$200; from the other two the robbers secured nothing.  
After failing to induce the district

attorney to issue a warrant for the arrest of the man whom he alleged had alienated his wife's affections, David G. Van Houten, a farmer, went to the Northern Pacific saloon in Portland at 8:15 p. m. and, without warning shot Albert Young, one of the proprietors, who died three hours later from the effects of the wound. Van Houten escaped and has not been captured.
